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

The article in our January magazine about the 400th Anniversary of the King James Bible prompted me to blow the dust off my own copy. Inscribed in the front are the



words 'With best wishes to Doreen on her Confirmation Day' and the date. I now need not only my specs, but also the help of a magnifying glass to read the small print on flimsy paper but this book remains a treasure which had a big part in my spiritual journey.

In Crux last month Philip Alexander from Manchester University wrote the following:

"2011: It's the year of the King James Bible. It has forged our national identity and moulded the spiritual life of our churches. We use lots of phrases without realizing where they come from: 'the signs of the times', 'a law unto themselves', 'the powers that be ', and 'all things to all men'. "

I vividly remember on my wedding day over 50 years ago in his father of the bride speech my Dad told us – "don't go to bed vexed". I'm sure he didn't realize he was quoting from Ephesians 4: verse 26: Be ye angry, and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath.

Perhaps it is an age thing with me, harking back to the safety of my childhood when we were taught to accept rather than question; to read rather than analyse. Yet the words are still deep in my consciousness and come easily to mind when needed,

'I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help'

Whatever the reason, I have been inspired by the call from the Archbishop of Canterbury to re-discover and celebrate this treasure. To read, mark and learn again from it – this time with a little help from my magnifying glass.

As we have no 'From the Vicar' at the moment some members of the congregation have kindly agreed to take it in turn to write the lead article. This month Doreen pays tribute to Churchwardens.

Lord Help our Churchwardens.

Nowadays much of a churchwarden's responsibilities are to assist the vicar in the day to day smooth running of a parish. During an interregnum (when we are between vicars) they have a legal responsibility and share the extra duties for the church and its worship activities with the Area Dean.

Last year a magazine 'Cheshire Ancestor' had an article by Joan Irving telling how the role of churchwardens has changed over the years. In the past they kept close scrutiny on the morality and lifestyle of parishioners. The crimes of slander, adultery, non-observance of church holy days or a refusal to pay tithe were all entrusted to church courts for punishment. Wardens would present offenders to the court for sentence, and then ensure that the punishment - usually a simple naming and shaming - was carried out.

Churchwardens have, from time to time, been tasked with the extermination of vermin, the supervision of education, the maintenance of weapons for the militia, the allocation of pews, and the management of parish property. Some of their duties over the years have also included:

Reporting any morality or disorderly problems, i.e. drunkenness, swearing, disturbing divine service. Also non-attendance at church on Sundays and Holy Days.

The upkeep of bells, village clock, village stocks and bridges, whipping posts and lock-up.

Pay men to 'beat the bounds' (every 3 years) to check parish boundaries and note repairs to hedges etc.

Prevent people standing idle, walking or talking in Church or churchyard.

Fund raising was a bit different too. In July 1511 the churchwardens' accounts for a church in Cambridgeshire records expenditure on an open air play about St George, which was performed in the parish. The profit from the event was put towards a fund of money gathered for the image of St George, and ten years later the parish had saved enough to purchase a wooden statue of the saint, at a cost of £20.

As I thank God that some things have indeed changed, I hope you will join me in a simple prayer for Nancy and Janet – Lord Help our Churchwardens.

Consumers can use the website to sign up simultaneously to the Mailing Preference Service and the Telephone Preference Service, so they do not receive unsolicited sales and marketing telephone calls.





News from FOMO

On the 24 January Juliana, Nancy and I enjoyed a meal at the Ashton Soroptimists Speaker Meeting when the guests were Mary and Keith Woodworth who had come to talk about recent developments within the Charity they founded in 2000.

Many of you will recall the disturbing T V pictures of how Mary was imprisoned on a wrongful charge of trespass last year and it was a real relief for FOMO supporters to see her safely back in UK. I gave her a hug and was shocked at how much weight she has lost, she is only tiny to start with. In typical Mary fashion she tossed back her braids and said that she had put a lot back on! She always focuses on positives.

She is still downplaying events, that at the time must have been terrifying to her and the workers out in Malawi and we were especially horrified to hear of how, after her wrongful arrest she insisted at gunpoint that she would not be separated from the others and knew if she went to sleep that she would be shot. She forced herself to keep awake for three days and nights protecting herself and others.

After a protracted legal wrangle which took many months the judge finally dismissed the case. The man who had tried to take Mary's land thought he had so many *high ups* in his pocket a trouble-some woman was going to prove no difficulty and he learned a learned a valuable lesson. He is still around but his position is much weaker thanks to Mary and FOMO who throughout all this have had right on their side.

Despite the problems FOMO is continuing to thrive. Before Mary was allowed to leave Malawi but she could continue her work, she went to South Africa to purchase a much needed ambulance from funds raised in UK, she organised better conditions for the prisoners where she was held by getting a toilet installed and the cells painted and continued to distribute goods donated from UK from the recently arrived container sent from Preston.

Her energy is phenomenal and she is a real champion to the orphans and their guardians. The current Big Project is to build a secondary school for FOMO pupils. Keith gave us an update on some of the activities especially the 13 centres Sports Day when all the Centres compete against each other. Of interest to our Brownie Pack would be the prized bars of soap given to the winners of races etc. FOMO children turn their noses up at sweets as they prefer something that lasts and the highly prized bars of soap are what they want. Who knows, one of the bars our Soap stars contributed may have been given as a prize!

Mary was so grateful to all who took the trouble to write to the authorities here on her behalf and for keeping her in our prayers for so long. It was a great comfort to her. She and Keith are greatly concerned by corruption out in Malawi and if people reading this are also worried please contact your MP to find out more of how aid money donated by the government on our behalf is administered.

Mary and Keith were recently awarded a prestigious Beacon Fellowship for their work, and it was richly deserved. If you wish to support FOMO in any way please see their website <u>www.fomo.co.uk</u> for details and see more of the work of this tiny charity.
