Anniversary Weekend


Our Fair Trade afternoon tea will be on Saturday 25th June, it will be a bit special this month because in addition to cakes we will have strawberries, cream and scones.

In this month's lead article George Vernon tells us what's involved in looking after our Church.

'OUR HOUSE' AND GROUNDS AT ST.GEORGE'S

Looking after St. Georges church and grounds is not unlike the responsibility we have for the houses we each live in, except of course it is literally a bigger task. The bricks and mortar and grounds are of course on a much greater scale. Repairs have to be carried out, the building cleaned and things polished-up. Bills have to be paid. The grass has to be cut carefully around the graves and trees trimmed as required. Improvements made to various areas such as paths and maintenance of Headstones together with amenities inside the building- we have to keep dry and warm.

Church Wardens and Council have the responsibility for all this and more. However, great reliance is put upon volunteers in order to avoid expense from professional contractors in appropriate cases. This is where the so-called 'Fabric Committee' - really much more a fabric working group-comes into play.

In liaison with our church architect and guidance from our insurers, we have in force a maintenance programme guiding us through all tasks normally required in the care of our church throughout the year. In addition, our group members visually inspect the building for faults on a day to day basis, putting things right as required. Following this programme means having roof gutters cleaned to ensure rain water doesn't come inside church owing to blocked drains and checking for slipped slates- oiling locks and door hinges-testing of emergency lighting systems and examining /servicing radiators-painting the 'busy areas' more often than others to keep a smart and clean church: etc. etc.

Who sees to all this? The Fabric Committee- a small group of men which has thankfully almost doubled in size to five or six in number in the past few weeks. Generally, most routine work is done on one day in the week, when discussions will also take place on future work required and how to tackle italways with a view to minimizing cost. Paid contractors are called in where necessary but most work is carried out by the group at no cost other than materials needed, e.g. paint, petrol, light bulbs etc. Additional time is required particularly with cutting the grass in summer which seems like a

full-time job and one which could not realistically be done without the invaluable tractor-mower we acquired a few years ago.

As well as actually doing the work, some projects need a lot of research and discussion as to best way forward. Listed church buildings require special permission to alter things thereby involving the Diocese and/or Local Authority. A careful path has to be trod to ensure all is done correctly. Fortunately, St. George's has a particularly adept person in this field of expertise. He is much relied upon and amongst others, has recently guided us through applications for permission to carry out work on the Garden of Remembrance and proposed amendments to improve pathways around the church and main entrance which we hope to start this year.

We have recently installed a new lighting system into church with a saving of what must be several thousand pounds. This was made possible by the wholesale donation of time by a member, formerly a self-employed electrician, who installed the electrical systems without labour costs. Whilst he was ably assisted by various other volunteers, it is felt we would not have been able to do the work so quickly, if at all. This was particularly important as the lighting had to be completed before we could complete work in insulating the roof void. (which has never had any installed!) We are now experiencing the benefits of better lighting and insulation which is all aimed at reducing running costs, which leads me onto our next priority, a more cost effective heating system.


For years, we have pondered on replacing our boiler but have never had the money. It has now reached a stage where action must be taken. After having considered quotes from several contractors, we have been in discussion with a specialist church heating company who we feel is the best to assist us. This process was necessary because of our high usage of gas in running an old boiler with little sophistication to cater for the various heating needs of the church. Too often, the church Nave is too cold and the lounges stifling hot. We have been advised a modern, efficient boiler together with appropriate zone controls will bring savings in running costs.

Our heating fund is in it's infancy and follows immediately upon the heels of a roof insulation and lighting fund campaign. The need however for a more reliable and cost efficient boiler is great. Owing to this, a recent PCC meeting



took the decision to replace our forty year old boiler by installing a new boiler system. This will compliment the measures already taken to cut costs (roof insulation /new lighting system) and hopefully make an impact on our excessive gas usage. The financial burden is difficult to bear in our congregation and we are all so thankful for the money provided from within our church to enable completion of recent works. Grant organizations have so many demands on their resources. Our recent applications in relation to costly new roof gutters and extensive pointing of stonework have been unsuccessful. However, this will not deter us and we shall continue to make appropriate bids for assistance from outside our church to enable us to keep our building and grounds in as good a condition as possible.

We should all feel positive about our church fabric. We are now in a good position thanks to everyone's efforts. Significant improvements have been carried out over recent years despite a harsh financial climate and with restricted resources of our own. We now have a tasteful Garden of Remembrance and coupled with our scheme of cleaning headstones for a small fee, provides much respect and dignity to the memory of departed loved ones: To improve efficiency and save fuel costs, we now have excellent lighting and roof insulation in place: In addition, we now have a refurbished vicarage just awaiting an Incumbent.

The work of the fabric group complements other groups and individuals also working to get the most out of church life. We have a fine building and congregation who do indeed help each other, which I believe benefits the community in general. We enjoy the time working, especially if we are getting the necessary help from others. There is never a better time to rally round and help in any area of church life than when we do not have an Incumbent. We are so lucky to have very professional and committed Lay Clergy and Wardens -particularly at this time- together with some workers with professional skills which they offer to us. I'm sure the future is bright.

Fair trade goes from strength to strength

Despite recession and rising food prices, the fair-trade movement continues to attract ever-increasing support in the United Kingdom. Over 6,600 churches are now affiliated to the Fairtrade Foundation and more than 500 schools have joined. There are also over 500 Fairtrade Towns.

UK shoppers are continuing to embrace Fairtrade, showing no downturn in ethical values despite the tough economic times. Sales soared in the past year by 40 per cent, reaching an estimated retail value of £1.17 billion, compared with £836 million in 2009.

Every day in the UK we are now consuming an estimated 9.3 million cups of Fairtrade tea, 6.4 million cups of Fairtrade coffee, 530,000 of certified drinking chocolate and 3.1 million Fairtrade bananas. New categories are also growing, with over one million cosmetic products using Fairtrade ingredients sold in 2010.

This expansion into new areas has opened up more opportunities for producers. Juliana Sampana, a shea-nut gatherer from the Akoma Cooperative in Ghana (which has recently started selling shea butter into the UK Fairtrade cosmetics market) says: "Many women in our region and elsewhere have worked so hard to put food on their tables for their families through farming and odd jobs but end up with an unfair income, leading to poor diet and diseases such as kwashiorkor and beri-beri. With Fairtrade, women are assured of a fair wage for their hard work."

Fresh commitments from the business world here include the Co-operative's plan to convert all commodities that can be Fairtrade by 2013, starting with bananas. Topshop has launched a new range of cotton denim, while Marks & Spencer have introduced a new cotton range under its Indigo Green label. The majority of Waitrose tea is now Fairtrade.

The Fairtrade Foundation has welcomed the setting up of a Fair Deal Food (FDF) Council of UK food producers to campaign for a price that covers costs of production. It seems that the North of England is leading the way on this concern. Barbara Panvel of FDF says there is a real danger that if action is not taken we shall lose milk production in the UK and have to rely on imported milk in our Fairtrade coffee.
