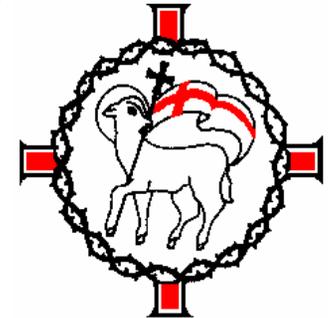



Before you leave on your summer holiday consider this and take care!

What **NOT** to do before you go on holiday

Criminals just love Twitter and Facebook. Now they can locate unattended homes so much more easily - often within seconds of people posting comments about being on holiday on these social networking websites.

Thieves once had it hard – having to wander about neighbourhoods, peering over hedges, bribing milkmen, looking for empty houses. Now it is so much simpler: they stay at home and surf the internet - and can track down your address from a one-line posting within 60 seconds, according to researchers. Thieves look for messages such as ‘packing my cases’ and ‘just landed’ with a smiley face, only hours after the sender’s location was given as an airport.

How do they do it? A check on the family name and, for instance, the name of their child’s school, cross referenced with an online address database, shows the location of the home. The study, by Co-operative Travel, goes on to warn people that their children are the worst offenders, as 51 per cent of young people tell their all their friends about the forthcoming holiday....

Social networking at the wheel

Be careful on the roads this summer: increasing numbers of motorists are actually accessing Facebook and Twitters while driving – with potentially ‘catastrophic’ consequences; the police warn. With the new mobile phones giving us access to social media, people are using their phones at the wheel even more, not less, despite the change in the law. BOILER FUND



As I write this article we are at the beginning of June I am expecting some warm summer days to come. Thinking of another cold winter is far from my mind but as church treasurer I still have to find £822.00 each month for our gas direct debit. This is a very large sum and we are told that prices are about to increase. Looking on the bright side we managed to insulate the roof space, which will, hopefully, offset some of the price rise.

Our fundraising this year has concentrated on purchasing a new boiler to replace our very inefficient antique. This will cost between £8,000 and £9,000, an enormous amount of money to raise but we already have about £1,500 and at last month's PCC it was agreed to borrow the remainder of the money from our Restoration Fund and start the work in August. This will mean we can reap the benefit from having a new boiler this coming winter.

There are lots of people doing bits behind the scenes to support our "Boiler Fund". For example the sale of donated handmade cards are a great success and there are several people who give extra on a regular basis but the growth of red spots on our chart has slowed down. I know we are all feeling "the pinch" but if you could find a way to donate a little extra or attend our "Free Trade Afternoon Teas" at church or perhaps have a coffee morning yourself it would help us reach our target sooner.

St. George's is always in need of extra money and last year it cost over £51,000 just to keep running. If you could manage to find that bit extra either for general funds or the boiler fund we will all be able to share in the benefits.

15th July St Swithun (or Swithin) - Saint for a rainy day!



St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for our rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15 July, it will then rain for forty days after that.

It all began when he was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he has been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun.

Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester Cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation, and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.





Dear Friends,

I thought I would take this opportunity to tell you why I
am requesting old, broken or unwanted jewellery.

A few weeks ago I started as a volunteer at Willow Wood
Hospice working every other Wednesday. I was originally interviewed
to be a receptionist, but they asked me if I would like to do arts and
crafts with the patients instead, as I love working with arts and crafts
this was ideal for me.

My first thought though was, what could I do that would be interesting,
not too complicated and would look good as well? So, I emptied out
all my craft boxes. I still had left over from my daughter's weddings,
card to make up wedding favour boxes and small flowers, leaves
beads, ribbon and crystal. I obtained some dried lavender and we
made lavender boxes with flowers etc. and ribbon on the side. I made
a poem up to tie on i.e. *this little box of lavender calls, to be put in a
drawer next to your smalls*. I have to say they went down very well.

I also had some blank cards so these could be made up with the
flowers as birthday cards, thank you cards etc.

The problem is of course that patients come in every week on the
same day over an eight week period so really I need craft ideas that I
can rotate. My next session will be looking at jewellery, mending it,
breaking it up making new pieces etc. I can sometime reuse the
chains or fastenings of broken jewellery or use parts of old drop
earrings to remake into necklaces.

We will break up some beads and remake with new colours and
restring.

Everything we make the patients take home (usually as a present for
a member of their family) with no cost to them, this is why we try to
make things that have little or no initial cost to Willow Wood.

If anyone has any good craft ideas they would like to share with me,
or have any craft books they could lend me I would be very grateful.
Unfortunately I cannot knit so any knitting patterns are out I'm afraid.

I have to say I was a bit nervous initially working with the patients, some of whom are terminally ill. But I need not have worried, the staff and patients are fantastic, most of the time they are very upbeat and enjoy teasing one another. Some have had very interesting lives and it is a joy to listen to their stories. Some are an inspiration with their good spirits and sense of humour. Also the staff are always happy and bubbly, making it very difficult to feel low. For some patients with little or no family close by it is a social occasion and highlight of their week.


It has also made me think how grateful I am for my own family and our current good health.



Adopt A Squaddie

After our son retired from the army after 22 years, and knowing how difficult it was for him in theatres of war, David and I wanted to carry on supporting our troops in some small way.

By chance I read about an organisation called *adoptasquaddie* and contacted them. I logged onto the website, followed the links to the joining page and after leaving my details I got an email back the next day saying thanks, welcoming me to the family and sending us the details of our soldier.

The website gives all kinds of help including a list of permitted items, marking up those which are in greater need. You can send up to ten boxes per soldier's tour of duty. There is a draft letter to include in case people are unsure of what to write, and how to wrap and post your box. There are also pictures of the soldiers and a poignant Memoriam section. It is run by ex forces personnel, their details are also available to read.

Once we got "our boy" David and I went shopping for goodies and to collect a shoebox from the always helpful "Shubar" in Ashton. Knowing that we could send 2Kgm free of postage we chose items which were especially needed such as shower gel, cotton socks and products for face and feet making sure that we had no aerosols in our basket. Then we chose tiny items to fill up the corners such as dental floss and chewing gum. Also useful are travel sizes of shampoo and conditioner and I put in a comb. Lastly I went a puzzle book and pen, some Haribo sweets, air mail "blueys" available free from post offices, and finally a note with our details and a bit about us. The whole thing was weighed on my kitchen scales and once I had realised that 2Kgm is not the same as 2lbs we wrapped the box in brown paper, addressed it as per the form, added my address and a customs form (the BFPO won't accept it without these important details) and took it off to the Post Office.

A month later a letter arrived from "our lad" thanking us for our box and telling us a bit about himself. He said it was 45.5 degrees when he was writing and said he had shared out the box with the lads. I had said if he had a little list, we would get things he really needed rather than things that he didn't. I also said, within reason, as the pension wouldn't have stretched to a season ticket at United or City! The things he asked for

were diverse. Could we send foot care products as they all have bad feet from wearing their boots all day? Also a pair of flip-flops, his had fallen to pieces. Lastly, if at all possible a Bible and diary as he had lost his when a rocket propelled grenade had hit his vehicle and all his kit was destroyed. Seemingly he does long range patrols and they carry all their kit with them hence why his Bible was in the vehicle when it was hit. However he did say right at the end of the letter that if we could only manage some things that the foot care products would be the most needed. I found the whole letter very moving. We got together a quick package of the diary and sundry items including the flip-flops, foot cream and some more sweets and sent that off. The sweets are vital as they help clear the sand from their throats as well as being a comfort.

Knowing that Bishop Mark was coming to take the Pentecost Service, I asked if he would bless the Bible and sign it but he went much further, leaving the Bible on the Altar throughout the Service and after blessing the Bible he prayed rousingly for the work of all the armed forces and mentioned those from our church who are presently out in Afghanistan. He also wrote a short note to our soldier and the Bible has gone on its way to join its new owner.
