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

Dear Friends

If you have ever been fortunate enough to travel on a large ship – be it a cruise liner, ferry or merchant ship – then you will know the reliance that these majestic vessels place on the smaller, seemingly less interesting pilot boats whose service is essential for the safe arrival in port.



The season of Advent is not unlike the pilot boat. It seems insignificant, dark and dull, like the failing light and fallen leaves that surround us. The church coverings and clergy vestments are purple. There is impatience for the bright Christmas tree lights, the rousing and joyful carols and the sense of goodwill that pervades the festive season.

However, far from being insignificant, Advent Sunday marks the church's New Year. We begin a new cycle of readings in our services and it is a time of expectant waiting and prayerful lead-up for the great celebration of Christmas. To reach Christmas without this quieter time of reflective preparation is like sailing into port without the pilot boat. The arrival will be buffered, bruised and scratched around the edges. The secular trappings and whirl of activity leave you wondering 'if it's all worth it?" In the words of Max Ehrmann, the American writer, we would do well to "Go placidly amid the noise and haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence".

As we begin this 'New Year' at St. George's, we will be gaining the services of four new Eucharistic Assistants to help with the chalice at our Sunday services. They are Steve Fallows, Val Fallows, Freda Taylor and Ann Winstanley. The P.C.C. has approved their appointments and this has been confirmed by the Diocese. We hope, very much that they will be welcomed by all.

We are delighted by these appointments but are always in need of more help. Does anyone feel able to act as an Altar Server? At present there are only three people fulfilling this task which, obviously, places a great deal of pressure on them. Spreading the load makes life a little easier for everyone. As most of you are probably aware, the likelihood of someone being appointed as our full-time parish priest has receded and the Diocese is looking at the possibility of St George's becoming part of a team with three other churches. This is not going to be imminent, however, and so the interregnum, already almost a year old, will be the longest that this church has faced since the mid 1950's.

We are truly blessed with our own 'pilot boats' - the many volunteers who have been maintaining our worship, fabric, practical arrangements, outreach, and financial/legal requirements and helping to steer us along. This working and pulling together fosters a sense of fellowship which is so important at any time, but especially so during a vacancy. At this point I would like to extend my own very grateful thanks to everyone who has supported and encouraged me personally during this past year, both in prayer and in deed – it has helped enormously.

May the eager expectation of Advent and the wondrous celebration of another Christmas bring joy and gladness to all our hearts.




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

Christmas: Why does it begin at midnight with Holy Communion?

Some Christmas Questions Answered!

The hour was first chosen at Rome in the fifth century to symbolise the idea that Christ was born at midnight - a mystical idea in no way hindered by historical evidence! No one knows the hour of his birth.

Certainly in recent times, Holy Communion at midnight on Christmas morning has proved popular with modern families. One British writer pointed out its "domestic convenience" in 1947: "for where there are children and no servants, husband and wife may be unable to communicate at any other time." (So things don't change, then!) Christmas: Where did Christmas trees come from?

There are two early stories that mention fir trees. The first involves St Boniface, who went to Germany in the 8th century as a missionary and found people sacrificing a child to their god under an oak tree. Boniface was appalled, and rescued the child. He then chopped down the oak tree and found a tiny fir tree growing nearby. He gave this to the people and said: "This is a symbol of life. Whenever you look at this tree, remember the Christ-child who is the one who will give you life, because he gave his life for you."


The second early fir tree story involves Martin Luther in the 16th century. It is said that one year he decided to drag a fir tree into his home and to decorate it with candles. He used it as a visual aid, telling people that the candles symbolised Jesus as the light of the world, and the evergreen tree symbolised the eternal life that Jesus gives to us. Many of the people who followed Luther were struck by the idea, and took up the custom.

Where did Christmas stockings come from?

No one is really sure, but a story is told of St Nicholas, a bishop who lived in the 4th century, who may have started the custom by accident. St Nicholas was of a wealthy family, and of a generous heart. As Christmas approached one year, he wanted to help a poor family whom he knew, but he did not want them to know it was him. So he climbed up on their roof on Christmas Eve and dropped some coins down the chimney.

The next morning the coins, to the great surprise of the family, were found in the stockings of the ladies, who had hung them to dry by the fire the night before. Every year after that they put their stockings out, in the hope that some more money would fall into them. They told the story of this amazing appearance to their friends and neighbours, and the custom caught on.
