

From the Vicar

Dear Friends.

As we are now emerging from Lent into Easter, I was reminded recently about why it seems, so often, that we tend to blame God for everything when things go wrong yet seldom thank Him for when things go right. True or false? What does the bible say.



especially about suffering? At first glance, not a lot, perhaps.

Job's wife actually said, "Curse God and die." Her husband longed for 'a death that will not come.' (Think of the euthanasia debate currently). How often do we ask ourselves, "Why doesn't God do somethina?"

Perhaps the Bible doesn't give simple, direct answers, but let's remind ourselves that we are fitted with brains and are free to use them, objectively or otherwise. Some suffering comes about because we have free wills; we enjoy a freedom delegated from God to humanity. Sadly, as we all know, it isn't always used humanely. Less dramatically, think of the story of Adam and Eve and the forbidden fruit. Think of the misused freedom the prodigal son 'enjoyed' (and the result!) World leaders are free to 'crucify the Lord of Glory'. Even in this country Christians are being put under increasing pressure to admit our supposed 'irrelevance' regarding affairs of state. Some kinds of suffering, for instance, from warfare or injustice, are the result of human abuse of this freedom to choose

You have heard it said before that we live in a fallen world. Paul told the Romans that creation is 'frustrated' and 'in bondage to decay'. Sin affects us all. 'Thorns and briars' grow in the 'garden of the Lord.' Is it possible to see how some pain, grief or natural disaster, etc., might be explained?

Like it or not. I don't think we can duck the fact that we cannot soften the blow of biblical truth because, in a moral universe. suffering is sometimes the result of sin. Sin warps God's creation and spoils it.

As I say above, we have the God-given freedom to use our brains

for good or ill. Given that we exercise this choice in a physically stable, regular and predictable world and what happens? Is this not the very combination of circumstances which makes real choice possible? Surely this is what it says on the packet, but there is also a health warning - the fire that brightens and warms us can also burn and disfigure if misused. A packet containing the ingredients for a sinful life may also contain its own retribution so we must be careful how we open God's packet and be equally careful as to how we use the contents.

True enough, we all make mistakes and God will forgive and help us, provided we keep trying and remember a famous quote by Sir Robert Mark, a former Manchester City bobby who rose to the rank of Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, "The only man who never made a mistake never made a decision."

Thanks be to God.



Although it was a memorable service, the new showbiz couple in the parish hadn't quite got the idea of a donkey for Palm Sunday.



'No!' the customer exclaimed. 'Barbers don't exist because if they did, there would be no people with dirty long hair and untrimmed beards, like that man outside.'


'Ah, but barbers DO exist! That's what happens when people do not come to me.'

Why does an interregnum sometimes last for so long?

Actually, there are no set rules on the length of time a church should have 'between vicars'. But every diocese will be bearing the following the mind:

An interregnum means one less salary to pay, and thus saves hard-pressed dioceses money. Secondly, it can be hard to find a suitable incumbent – there are ever fewer clergy to go round. Thirdly, once someone has been found, there is a seemingly endless consultation process between bishop, patron & parish to be carried out. Fourthly, even once someone has been found, approved by all, and is ready to come, extensive work may be needed on the vicarage. Finally, an incoming incumbent has to give notice of resigning. So, while it needn't be as drawn out as an American Presidential Election, sometimes it doesn't seem too far off!



This month we give you the third in a series on Queen Elizabeth II, looking back down the 60 years of her reign. David Winter, former head of Religion for the BBC, has compiled this for us. This month we consider the love and marriage of Elizabeth and Philip...

Diamond Jubilee: Elizabeth - pt 3. 'To love and to cherish'

In 2011 the marriage of Prince William to Catherine Middleton was the celebrity event of the year - and not just in Britain. The world-wide television audience for the wedding in Westminster Abbey was numbered in hundreds of millions and the media coverage bordered on the hysterical. It may be hard for people under seventy to believe, but the engagement and later the marriage of Princess Elizabeth to Lieut. Philip Mountbatten attracted a similar level of public interest 65 years ago, though the celebrity scene was somewhat more restrained in those days.

People had known for some time that love was in the air. The dark and petite princess was often to be seen with her tall and fair-haired escort. Speculation in the popular press was rife. Was the heir to the throne about to be engaged to this handsome young naval officer, despite his Greek and Danish family background - and even family connections with Germany?

Eventually the engagement was announced, to be followed by the information that Philip would renounce his Greek and Danish titles. Indeed, when they married he even gave up his family name, Mountbatten, though not without regret. 'Am I the only married man', he asked, 'whose children will not bear his name?' He became Philip Windsor - a more reassuringly British surname than his foreign-sounding family name, I suppose.

The wedding was eagerly anticipated. Britain was in the middle of long years of post-war austerity. Food was still strictly rationed, and the first months of 1947 saw a cruelly cold Winter, when the temperature refused to climb above freezing for weeks on end and coal was in short supply because trucks full of it were stuck in ice-locked sidings. People were wondering - if this was how it was for the victors, how were the vanquished faring? (The answer was, about the same, as it happens.)

So the prospect of a glamorous and splendid public occasion lifted the spirits. Thousands of people camped out on the streets of London on a damp November day to watch the royal carriages sweep past on their way

to Westminster Abbey, a to catch a glimpse of the bride, and then the married couple on their way back. Even in black and white photographs one could see how happy they were and the depth of their love for each other. This marriage, at least, was certainly made in heaven.

There was more public rejoicing the following year when their first child, Charles, was born, to be followed by Anne in 1950, Andrew in 1960 and Edward in 1964. The House of Windsor was truly in business again!
