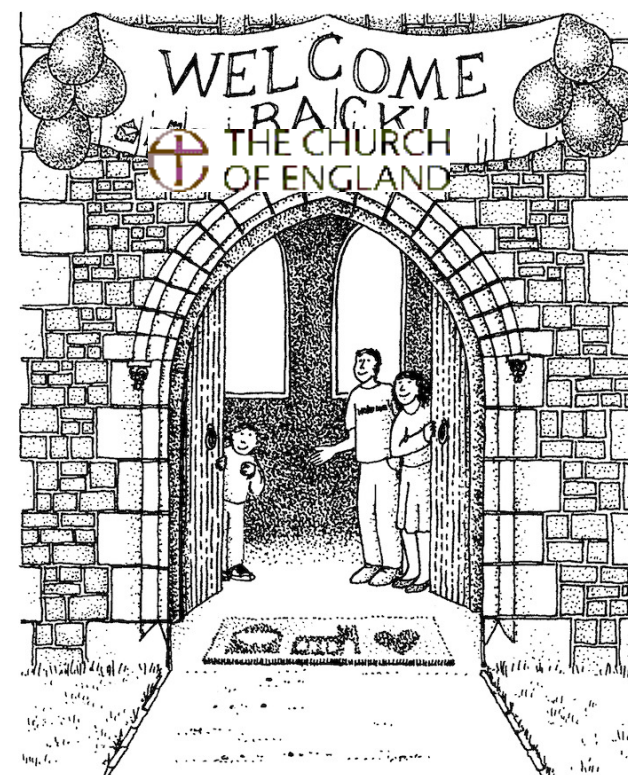

Wherever you are!

I have been thinking recently about the above song title that was made famous by the Military Wives Choir (and most recently Tameside Community Voices!) and it set me thinking about what it is like to be a Christian in our world today.

There are many people that we meet in our day to day lives that have no church connections at all and the only way they are going to find out about how much they are loved by God and what Jesus has done is what they see and hear in the newspapers, on television or by meeting those of us who can witness to that fact.

However, if we leave it to newspapers and television they are often not reliable when it comes to telling the truth. Quite often they go in for sensationalism instead of portraying the love and care Jesus has for everyone – as that can come across as not being newsworthy. Yet, we have probably the greatest news EVER that needs far more coverage than anything else that is broadcast in the media.

A dear friend shared this little story with me and I think it is so true. It is about a scientist who supposedly discovered a cure for a major disease that was killing everyone on the planet and yet that scientist chose to keep this information all to himself and not share the cure.

We would think that would be a crazy thing to do, wouldn't we? Yet we who know that Jesus died so that our sins might be forgiven and that our future is secure knowing that He is preparing a place for us in Heaven – and this is available for EVERYONE if only they too would welcome Him into their lives – are often as reluctant as the scientist in telling others this Good News (The Gospel).

So going back to the song 'Wherever you are' it serves as a timely reminder that we are a witness for Jesus on a daily basis wherever we are and people are viewing our relationship with Him by the words we say, the actions we take and the way we live our lives.

May I finish by sharing a poem that sums up all these thoughts really well:-

The Gospel According To You by Leroy Brownlow

There's a Gospel according to Matthew; To Mark;
To Luke, and John too.
There's another Gospel that many are reading...
The Gospel according to You.

The teachings we find in the Bible
Are facts we know to be true;
You must live them to make them the Gospel...

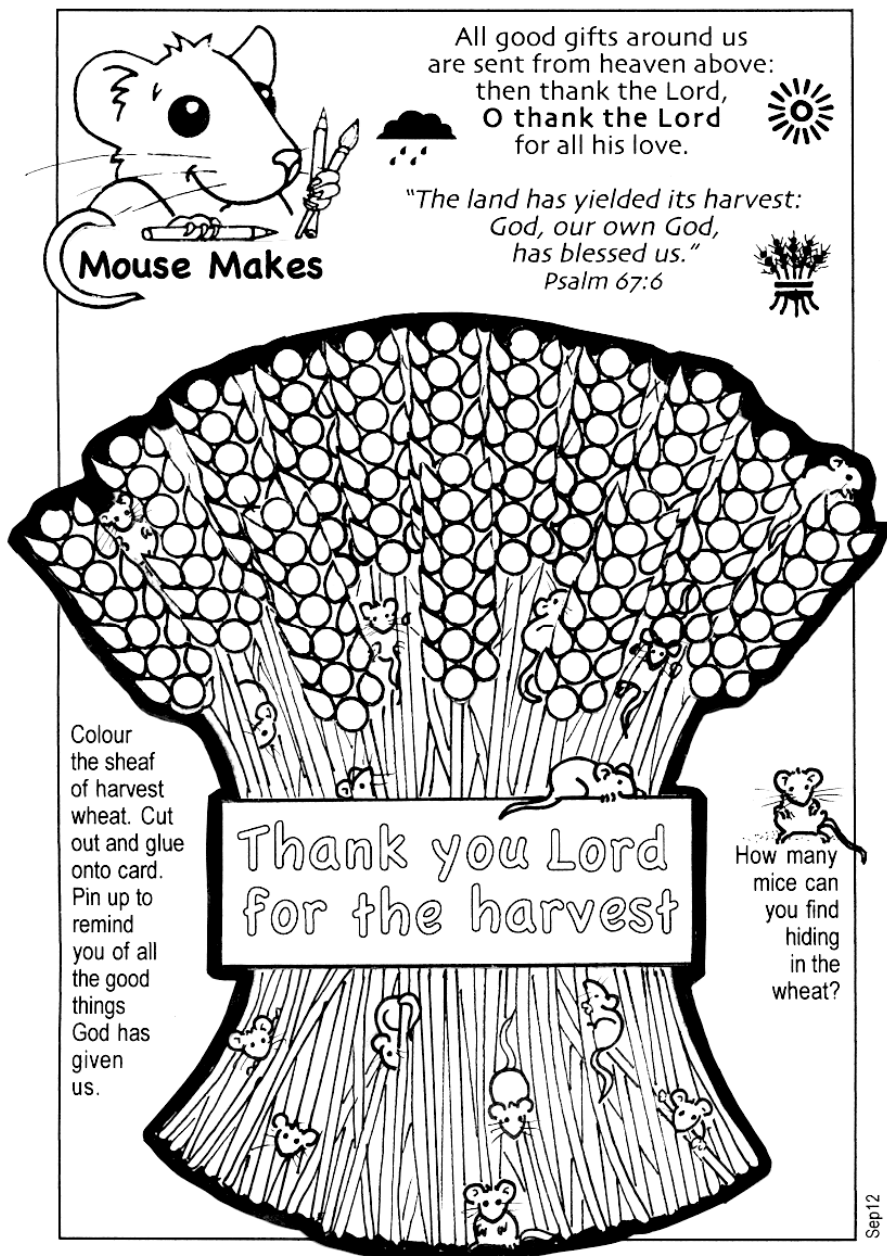

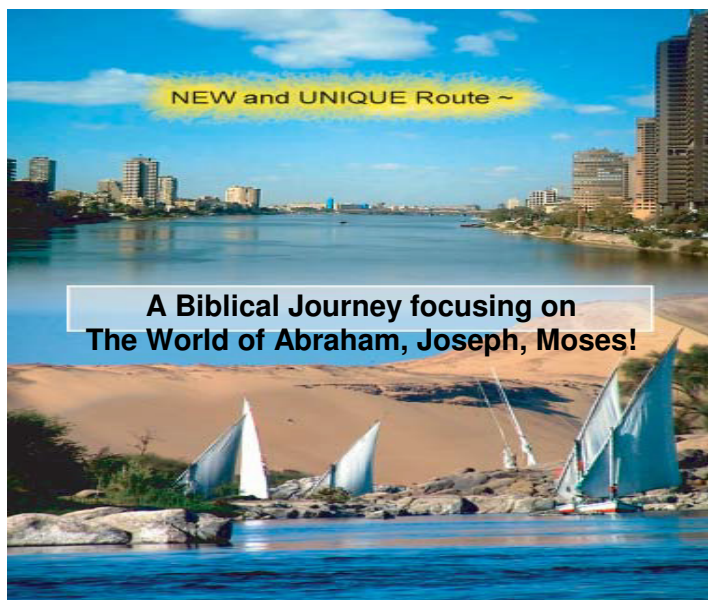

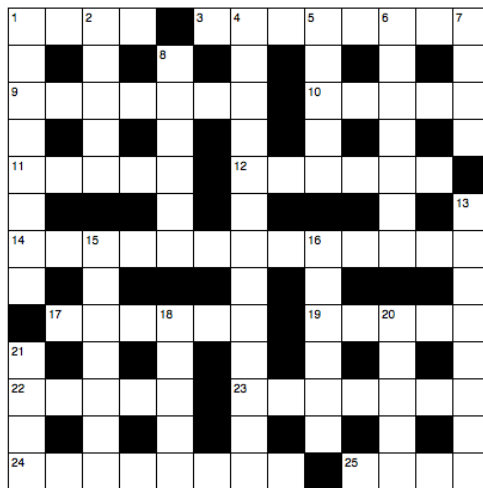

Sunday 23 September is Back to Church Sunday at St George's but how do we prepare for such a big event?

Will you be in church on 23 September? If so, please help us make any visitors to the church feel as welcome as they really are. Here are some tips to remember that day:

- First impressions matter. Let's be friendly! Smile!
- Help people feel at ease. When you see someone arrive whom you don't know, go over and introduce yourself by name. Tell them about the tea and coffee afterwards, where the loos are, and perhaps explain about the loop system for hearing aids. If they have young children, reassure the parents that it is okay if their child makes noise or wanders around and the crèche is always available.
- Don't talk funny... Some of our churchy phrases might mystify a visitor – if they ask about any aspect of the service, explain it in simple English.
- But do talk....! especially at the end of the service. Don't leave guests lonely on their own, while you talk to your friends!
- After the service invite them to join you in a cup of tea or coffee, don't let them just leave thinking we are unfriendly.
- Give them something to hang on to. A lot of non-church people have fond memories of old hymns and other bits they remember from the past, as this will also be our Harvest Thanksgiving there should be plenty of familiar hymns.

A prayer for coming back to church:

Loving God, thank you for welcoming me back to church this month. Help me to understand and receive your love, help me to be welcoming to others. When I am feeling lost or sad or lonely, when life is dark and difficult, when I am less than I should be, when I have gone astray, be for me a wise and gentle shepherd, guide me home, and lead me in the right paths.

Diamond Jubilee

This month we offer you the eighth in a series on Queen Elizabeth II, looking back down the 60 years of her reign. This month we consider...

Diamond Jubilee: Elizabeth - pt 8. : A MATTER OF SECURITY

1977 saw the first of a string of Jubilees - albeit stretched out over a period of 35 years - which the Queen would enjoy. This first one, her Silver Jubilee, honoured a mere 25 years on the throne. It was marked with public celebrations, though few, perhaps, would have suspected that we'd be doing it all over again in 2002 and 2012 - and may well be doing it once more in 2022! After all, the Queen's mother lived past her century, so the signs are promising.

The Irish Troubles had highlighted the need for efficient security for all public figures, including the Queen. In fact, she and the Duke of Edinburgh had never paid much attention to it, happily walking through crowds of well-wishers, accepting flowers and presents and generally looking relaxed and at ease. However, during the Trooping of the Colour in 1981 a young man fired six shots at the Queen as she rode her horse, Burmese, down the Mall in London.

Happily, the shots were blanks, but the Queen needed to demonstrate her equestrian skills in controlling the frightened horse. The assailant was arrested, tried and imprisoned, but those responsible for royal security were alerted to the real dangers in the modern world associated with such public appearances.

However, one might have assumed the Queen would be safe in her own home. Yet the next year, during the Falklands Conflict, an intruder, Michael Fagan, managed to make his way into the Queen's bedroom in Buckingham Palace. Despite her two phone calls to the Palace security desk, it took seven minutes for staff to arrive and arrest the intruder. In the meanwhile he sat on the end of her bed and they talked.

The Falklands Conflict saw her son Andrew serving as a helicopter pilot in the battle zone, so safety was also a family issue. The IRA had carried their bombing campaign into the towns and cities of England, and security at every level became a paramount issue. It's interesting to see how the Queen herself responded. Of course she had security officers standing nearby at public events, but she never allowed security issues to erect barriers, physical or psychological, between herself and the public. The impression she gave was of a woman of remarkable personal courage and calmness. And beside her, always, the calm, tall figure of her 'rock', the Duke of Edinburgh.

OLYMPICS LONDON 2012

Final farewell to the Olympics and Paralympics....

What a summer of sport it has been! As we say a final farewell to the best athletes in the world, did you know...

1. The gold, silver and bronze hierarchy was first introduced in the 1908 London Olympics.
2. William Shakespeare first published the word 'Olympian' in 1590.
3. Every national flag in the world contains at least one of the five colours in the Olympic rings.
4. 10,500 competitors from 205 nations were competing in 26 sports in the 2012 London Olympic Games.
5. 4,200 competitors from 147 nations are competing in 21 sports in the 2012 Paralympic Games.
6. An estimated four billion people, more than half (56%) of the world's population, watched the opening ceremony and other parts of the Games on television or other ways.
7. 200 buildings were demolished to make way for the Olympic Park, including the 6,000-seater Kingsway International Christian Church, now meeting in Walthamstow instead.
