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

Dear Friends

It was exactly a year ago that I wrote in the magazine about vocation and about parish life without a full-time vicar. At the time, both Keith and I were asked whether one of us would 'be promoted' to become the vicar. And I wrote about Ordained Local Ministry or OLM for short.



Since then, of course, the situation has changed in a way that I could not have foreseen a year ago. At my Ministerial Development Review last September, the Bishop of Middleton said that he had wondered why there had been no real interest from anyone to become the new vicar of St George's. After mulling this over he thought, perhaps, that no-one had come forward because God was saying that there is someone there already - me!

After much thought, prayer and interviews with three Chaplains, it was decided by the powers that be, that I should become Priest-in-Charge or 'the vicar' by any other name. The main difference between the two is that a Priest-in-Charge is licensed to the parish for a set number of years, usually five, and the position is reviewed after that time. With the current problems of clergy/parish ratio, there is a need to keep situations open-ended and this gives more flexibility both to the Diocese and the parish.

You may wonder how this will change things. From 22 March, when I was licensed as Priest-in-Charge, by the Bishop of Middleton, I became a stipendiary (paid) minister and transferred from Ordained Local Minister which was the voluntary position that I have had for the last twenty years. In these days of fewer people coming forward for ordination, the church is having to think of different ways of running the parishes – team ministries, for instance and/or transferring OLMs and NSMs into full-time stipendiary employment.

But this means that there is a vacancy for another OLM at St George's!!! Ordained Local Ministers each have a specific job description within a parish – mine was pastoral care, especially of the elderly. The Care Bears team was set up as a result of this and now needs someone to take over the organisation of the Team. In the parish there are many areas that need development and it is a great

privilege to serve as an OLM or indeed a Reader, as Keith and I were, before we were ordained. There are now also Authorised Lay Ministers, where a person is given responsibility to do a particular job in church without the onus of ordination. If you feel that God may be calling you to such a ministry, then please have a word with me and we can talk it through. And remember, you are never too old to learn – just look at me!

You'll know the saying about a new broom.....but the only thing I'll be sweeping up at the moment are the leaves at the front door! Seriously though, as most of you will know, I have been attending St George's all my life, and though never previously having had any personal authority, I have been lucky enough to work with former incumbents who have usually discussed any proposals regarding change before going ahead with them. I fully intend to do the same so that our shared ministry tradition continues.

As our Archdeacon and Area Dean both pointed out in their recent sermons, there must be change and there should be change, otherwise I would not be fulfilling the task that has been entrusted to me, but I cannot do this alone. We need to work together to find how we can encourage more people to come to church so that they may come to faith in Jesus. How can we get more children involved? How can we pay our Parish Share in full? There are other issues that need addressing too, such as the feasibility of installing a lift to the upstairs hall to make the whole building accessible to all. I'm planning to hold a brainstorming session sometime soon, when anyone can raise items that they believe need attention and then we'll look at each in turn.

The Vision Statement we made for St George's sometime ago still stands:

God wills that all people live in peace and love.

The church is called to be the agent of God's rule, drawing people into harmony with God, with each other and with the natural world.

As part of the One Holy and Apostolic Church, as part of the Church of England, and the Diocese of Manchester, we respond with joy to God's love.

We seek to share in all that we do, clergy and lay people together, supporting and encouraging one another.

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WORSHIP

We want our worship of God to be as good as possible and involve as many as possible to try to make it awesome, worshipful and helpful as possible to people of all ages and all kinds.

NURTURE

Our pastoral care group is a sign of our concern for others.

We aim to be aware of each other's needs and of the needs of our neighbours.

WITNESS

We want better communications both within the church and outside it.

We will seek to do this so that God's work may be more clearly known.

SERVICE

As a Parish Church we are for all within the parish boundary. We aim to look for new ways to ensure we grow outward in service.

If you were asked what might be the mark of an excellent church, I wonder what your reply would be. People in the pews? Paying our full share of the Quota? Having a building that is free from problems? Well, Jesus, the founder and head of the Church said this about greatness — it's all to do with service. When Jesus described true greatness in a person he contrasted the 'power structure' — the 'recognized rulers who lord it over their subjects' — with the genuinely great. 'Whoever wants to be great must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be the willing slave of all.' (*Mark 10.35-45*)

In God's kingdom, the question is not, 'How many people do we have on a Sunday?' or 'How big is our electoral roll?' No, the true question is simply, 'How much service can we give?'

With my very best wishes to you all at this Easter season and in the coming weeks and months.





Dorothy Hewitt, a member of our congregation, came to speak to us about her time in the Land Army during World War II. Dorothy explained, that because she didn't work in a reserved occupation, on reaching 17 years of age she would be called up to do some

sort of war work and had hit on the idea of joining the Land Army. Mainly because she didn't fancy the forces and she certainly wasn't going into "munitions". At first her father was having none of it, but eventually came round to the idea. Her trip to Manchester to be fitted for her uniform didn't go smoothly - apparently she was an inch too short and they didn't have a uniform small enough. Anyway this problem was eventually conquered and on the allotted date she set off to Reaseheath College in Cheshire for a month's training. On arrival the girls were paired up and given a timetable of the different farming jobs they would be doing each day. Her partner only lasted 3 days! So Dorothy spent the remainder of her time happily "ploughing on regardless" (no pun intended).


Even her journey to the farm she had been allocated didn't quite go to plan but eventually she arrived and spent three and a half happy years working on a farm with a wonderful family. The children are still visiting her today.

But it wasn't all work and no play!! With two other Land Girls from a neighbouring farm she seems to have spent a considerable amount of time at all the village dances within cycling distance. An added bonus was that there was a RAF aerodrome nearby, so plenty of dance partners! In fact this is where she was to meet her future husband Reg - but that's another story!

I won't say how old Dorothy is - but as she herself said - "you have to be at least eighty six to have been working during the war". Obviously all the hard work and fresh air during her youth have kept her looking so fit and young today. Thank you Dorothy for a hilarious evening.
