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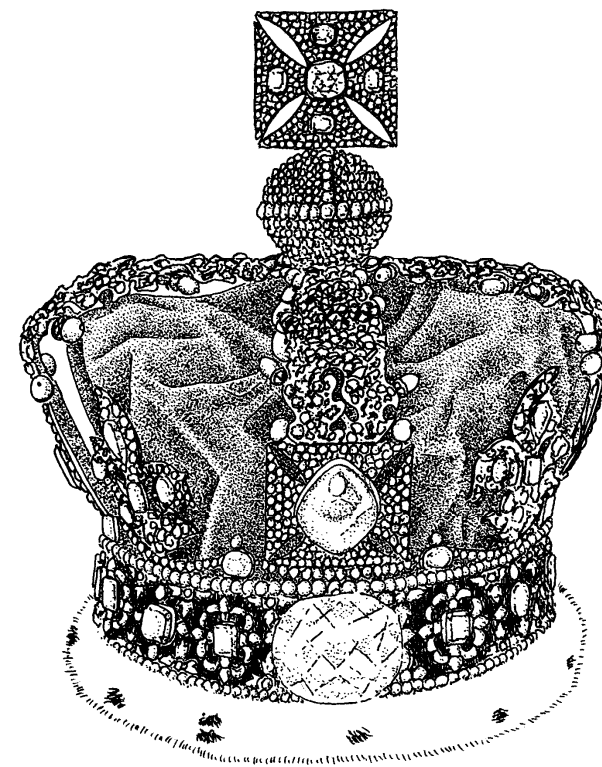

A CLEARER VISION

Dear Friends,



At the end of April I had a cataract removed from the same eye that suffered a detached retina in October of last year. At the time of writing I am still awaiting a different prescription for some new glasses but, already, I can see much more clearly than before the operation.

Even with a new prescription my vision will not be perfect but new lenses will help to define outlines more clearly and, hopefully, there will be much improvement.

On May 7th we held an open meeting to discuss a vision for St. George's. Those present were invited to raise issues that they thought needed attention in our church life and Christian witness. It was an eye opening and productive start to what I hope will be a series of such 'think tank' sessions. There were substantial areas of concern and, obviously, these will need to be prioritised so that each can be addressed fully and constructively and not just brushed over. I hope that before each new meeting, something concrete, however small, will have been achieved so that we don't just talk, but are continually and actively doing something to move ourselves forward.

Major areas of concern involved communications, various worship issues, pastoral care, parish share, growth in faith, children, vocations, fellowship, mission, stewardship, use of talents, job sharing, etc. It is true that in many organisations, including the church, eighty per cent of the work is done by twenty per cent of the people. Most of us have something that we could do and the very first step that we have taken is to hand out little slips of paper asking people to write down anything they feel able to offer to the life of our church. Many people are reluctant to push themselves forward for fear of 'treading on someone else's toes' but, nothing ventured, nothing gained and sharing tasks encourages fellowship. Many a new and good idea has been born from chats over the washing up bowl, or the lawn mower.

It is easier, sometimes, to dwell on the negatives and those present were very aware that we have so much already that is positive. Newcomers have remarked that they have been made to feel very

welcome and we have a band of workers who give freely of their time and talents in so many (often unseen) areas. Thank you to all of you for this.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 4th June at 7.45p.m. in the church lounge. Please can I encourage you to come along and help in this really important task?

On the 16th of this month at 6.30p.m. in St. Gabriel's Church in Cockbrook, there will be the annual Confirmation service for our particular area. At the time of writing we have just one candidate who will be confirmed and I hope that some of you will come along and give Kira your support and welcome her as she becomes a full and communicating member of the church.

On the 23rd we will celebrate the 173rd anniversary of the consecration of our church building. There will be three services:

8.30a.m. Said Holy Communion

10.45a.m. Worship For All during which the sermon slot will be filled by the Junior Church and the choir will sing an anthem.

6.00p.m. Sung Holy Communion according to the Book of Common Prayer

Please come along to share in this special day. In two years time we will celebrate our 175th anniversary – and as we all know how quickly time seems to pass these days – we are already inviting ideas of how we can best celebrate this significant milestone. The Bishop of Middleton has agreed to spend part of the Sunday prior to the actual anniversary (which falls on Wednesday June 24th 2015) with us and we are hoping that there will be a series of different and very varied celebrations. Please speak to one of the clergy or wardens if you have any ideas on this or, if you are not a regular worshipper but receive this publication, then you could submit them via our website www.stg.org.uk

We have so much to look forward to and I can really feel the willingness and support that's needed for us to move forward together so that we can all see more clearly the path that God has marked out for us. Our collective vision, like mine, may not be absolutely perfect, but it is becoming clearer through His grace.

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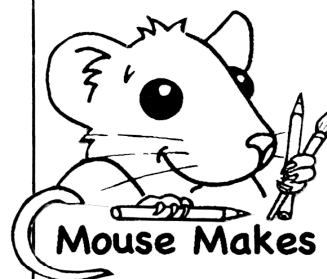

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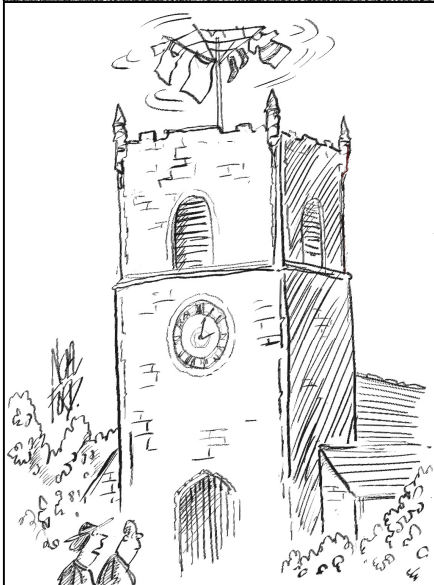

THE WAY I SEE IT: The Coronation: I was There!

It is, as you may have noticed, the sixtieth anniversary of the Queen's coronation this month. If you are under 55 it is probably simply a matter of history. That piece of history, however, will be relived this month in many grainy pictures on our television screens - even, perhaps, some in colour, from the cinema newsreels of the time. For those of us over that age, however, it is probably one of those memories - images, really - that you can never quite forget. In truth, it is part of our history.

Millions, like me, sat in a crowded room and gazed at a tiny television screen on which black and white images appeared of the distant scene in and around Westminster Abbey. Up till then, TV had been largely a rich person's toy, but no one was going to miss the event of a lifetime. We watched on rented sets, our own or a neighbour's. Television suddenly became available to almost everybody. Indeed, I can't think of anyone in our very ordinary circle of friends in a London suburb who didn't watch the coronation as it happened.

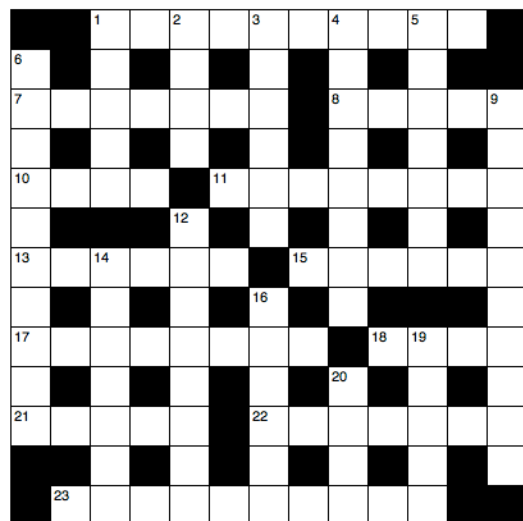
And that made a difference. Previous coronations had been great affairs of State, attended by the nobility, the great and the good - just a few hundred of them. True, the crowds could line the route to and from the abbey and cheer and wave flags, but once the real business began they were definitely outside. But now - miraculously, it seemed - we were inside: indeed, we had a better view of proceedings than most of those distinguished folk who had got tickets for the abbey.

This, like no other, was the People's Coronation, and the young Queen and her fair-haired sailor husband were the People's Monarchy, in a way none of their predecessors could possibly have imagined. When the archbishop placed the crown on her head, we were just feet away (or so it seemed). When he anointed her with oil, we could see it glisten. We could join in the prayers and the hymns, hear the glorious music and fanfares, share with the congregation in the abbey an occasion that was, after all, a vital part of the life of our nation and the Commonwealth.

Time and again over those few days we sang 'Long live our gracious Queen', and she has done it. 'Long to reign over us, happy and glorious'. Exactly.
