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

'Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and his name shall be called Emmanuel (which means, God with us)'

Christmas came early to the Trafford Centre. As I write this (mid November) we have just been shopping there and purchased some of our Christmas presents – not all, there are more to get! Of course, it's not only the Trafford Centre, but more or less all our stores and



supermarkets have been having a festive time for some weeks now; the season of good cheer is a wonderful time for the world of commerce. Decorations abound in our streets and in our homes; Christmas trees festooned with strings of coloured lights draw exclamations of delight and amaze-ment from young and old alike.

But no forest of tinselled Christmas trees, no glowing shop window displays, can quite hide the fact that for many people, Christmas is something of an empty affair. We celebrate the birth of Christ, but in reality what we see around us is some-thing less happy and less truly human that what we might hope for. Two thousand plus years of Christianity, but how far we have still to go!

Of course, this is not to run down the Christmas presents or the happiness of the family party and even the extra welcome of joy and consideration for others that Christmas brings: these are all good and enjoyable and we wish everyone, a happy time -even if it might only last for the Christmas festival.

But in our thoughts this December we would do well to put aside, for a moment, all the feverish preparations and all thoughts of the festive arrangements. Christmas is not just an ancient story we

re-tell for our children: Bethlehem, shepherds, animals, angels, wise men and the wonder and glory of the new life in a simple cradle made from a manger. But we should not to stop there. The Christmas story is a new beginning, not an end in itself. If all that Christmas means to us is just the re-telling of a lovely and moving story, then we miss the point.

When God became human and dwelt among us, he made a new relationship with us. We, too, should respond each year, every Christmas, by making – each one of us – a new start. As we recall God being born into our world, let us ask that he may be born again in our lives: for we worship, not a God who was born in Bethlehem a long time ago, but Christ in God who lives today.

At Bethlehem Christ came to be with us, but the mystery of this is that his actual dwelling-place is within us. Each one of us has a human heart,

which ought to be the present-day cradle of the living Christ: Christ in us. If our faith has grown dim, if it is not as fresh and as vigorous as it used to be, then now is the time to replenish it. As we contemplate Mary's child, we ask for the presence of God within us to be restored and renewed.

One of the oldest Christian prayers we have seems to sum up our needs and our hopes for Christmas. This prayer is based on a familiar psalm (130 v5) and was used by early Christians at the Eucharist and indeed, still is:

As the watchman longs for the morning, So do our souls long for you, O Christ. Come, Lord Jesus, and make yourself known to us In the Breaking of the Bread; for you are our God for ever.

Advent, in the Church's year, represents the centuries of longing for a Saviour; a kind of dark age when the Lord God was not often seen. Like the watchman, humanity longed for the first signs of a dawn. This season is like that, with our souls beginning to stir, and responding to the new dawn of the Christian Day, the era of Christ. In his vision in the Book of Revelation, St John looked for the coming Christ. It must also be our vision, our hope and our desire – that God will dwell with us and that we shall be his people.

All this is a great mystery: a mystery that stems from another mystery, that of love. For God is love. He so loved the world that he sent his own Son into it, to redeem it. God, who in the beginning spoke to humanity through his creation, and afterwards through his prophets and teachers, through his word in the Holy Scrip-tures, has finally and most clearly spoken through Christ the Word made flesh – full of grace and truth.

May peace, joy and love, be with us all at Christmas; may the love of the Child of Bethlehem change our hearts and minds, and as we kneel at the Crib and share in the happiness of the Holy Family, so let us make our own families truly happy, and centres of love and faith and joy.

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





Dear Sir

Please be advised that all employees planning to dash through the snow in a one-horse open sleigh, going over the fields and laughing all the way are required to undergo a Risk Assessment addressing the safety of open sleighs for members of the public. 
Benches, stools and orthopedic chairs are now available for collection by any shepherds planning or required to watch their flocks at night. While provision has also been made for remote monitoring of flocks by CCTV cameras from a centrally heated shepherd observation hut, all facility users are reminded that an emergency response plan must be submitted to account for known risks to the flocks. The angel of the Lord is additionally reminded that - prior to shining his/her glory all around- s/he must confirm that all shepherds are wearing appropriate Personal Protective Equipment to account for the harmful effects of UVA,UVB and the overwhelming effects of Glory.

Following last year's well publicized case, everyone is advised that EEOC legislation prohibits any comment with regard to the redness of any part of Mr. R Reindeer. Further to this, exclusion of Mr. R Reindeer from reindeer games will be considered discriminatory and disciplinary action will be taken against those found guilty of this offence.

While it is acknowledged that gift bearing is commonly practiced in various parts of the world, particularly the Orient, everyone is reminded that the bearing of gifts is subject to Hospitality Guidelines and all gifts must be registered. This applies regardless of the individual, even royal personages. It is particularly noted that direct gifts of currency or gold are specifically precluded under provisions of the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act. Further, caution is advised regarding other common gifts, such as aromatic resins that may evoke allergic reactions.
