

### Dear Friends

We all know that November is a time for remembrance. Way back in 1605, under the leadership of an English catholic by the name of Robert Catesby, a group of men tried to assassinate the then King James I of England and



VI of Scotland but failed. Most people celebrate this event as Bonfire Night. We may not remember Robert Catesby, nor any of the other eleven, but we will certainly remember Guy Fawkes. It was Fawkes who was put in charge of the explosives, since he had served for ten years in the Spanish Netherlands during the Dutch Revolt and would have had a great knowledge of the damage that gunpowder could do to a building. In fact, he was discovered guarding thirty six barrels of gunpowder — enough to blow the House of Lords to smithereens. Since then, many special sermons have been preached and church bells rung and of course many bonfires lit, with Guy Fawkes sitting on top of the pyre. If you go to a firework display or bonfire, please do be careful and stay safe.

Moving on a number of days, we come to Armistice Day which falls on 1th November and commonly celebrated in the UK on Remembrance Sunday. The Armistice was signed at Compiegne in France between the allies of World War 1 and Germany and took effect at "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918. While this marked the end of the war on the Western Front, hostilities, however, continued in other regions, especially across the former Russian Empire and in parts of the Old Ottoman Empire.

The very first Armistice Day was held at Buckingham Palace when King George V hosted an evening banquet in honour of the President of the French Republic on 10 November 1919, whilst the morning of the 11 November saw the official Armistice Day remembrance with a two minute silence to honour and remember those who sacrificed their lives for the greater good. The first minute of the silence is for the twenty million or so people who died in the war, while the second minute is for those who have been left behind – wives, children and families of those deeply affected by the conflict.

The First World War, of course, was supposed to be the war to end all wars, but we know how that turned out and hostilities began again when Germany invaded Poland on 1st September 1939.

In Britain, during the Second World War, in order not to interfere with any wartime production, the two-minute silence was moved to the Sunday nearest the 11th November, should it fall on a weekday. Many Commonwealth countries did the same and it became known as Remembrance Sunday. In recent years, Armistice Day has become increasingly recognised with many people attending the 11.00am ceremony at the Cenotaph in London. When Armistice Day falls during the week, the Royal British Legion hosts "Silence in the Square" in Trafalgar Square and this culminates with members of the public placing poppy petals into the fountains. Those not able to get to London still themselves from whatever they are doing – shopping, housework and so on for the two minutes silence.

Here at St George's we shall again be remembering the fallen at our service beginning at 10.30am on 9th November. Many today still live with terror and violence on their doorsteps, it is part of their daily life, but we pray that God will be with them in their struggles for justice and peace and for an end of all wars and terrorism.

At the beginning of the month, we also have another service, on Sunday 2nd November at 3p.m. when we will be remembering our loved ones. May I invite you all to this quiet and beautiful service when we will light candles in memory of those whom we love, but see no longer. They may have died, but our love for them goes on. As we commemorate the departed, we give thanks to God for their lives and examples, and for the fact that "nothing can separate us from the love of God". Even in death, those we have loved, but see no longer, are part of the body of the risen Lord. We also ask for God's continuing blessing on their relatives, friends and all who mourn.

You are more than welcome to join us at all our services.

### Saint of the Month

# 19 November Hilda, Abbess of Whitby, 680

Hilda was a princess within the Deiran (Northumbrian) dynasty, with connections to the East Anglia royal

family. She was baptized by Paulinus, Bishop of York (Feast Day 10 October).

Hilda's sister became Queen of the East Angles. This region was greatly influenced by the Gallic Church, and this spurred Hilda to travel to Chelles, near Paris, with the aim of taking her monastic vows. However, before Hilda reached Gaul she was recalled by Aidan (Bishop of Lindisfarne – Feast Day 31 August) to Northumbria. After living a solitary life for a short period of time, she was made abbess of a religious house at Hartlepool in 649.

In 657 Hilda founded a religious community at Streasnaeshalch, later named Whitby by the Danes. Whitby came to have a significant role in the development of the faith in England. Whitby was a double monastery (a community of both men and women, but governed by a single head) and was a royal establishment. No fewer than five bishops were trained there, and the community became famous for its learning.

Whitby was the location for the celebrated Synod of 664, and Hilda was hostess for the gathering. The Synod was called in 664 to decide upon the date of Easter, which was a point of contention between the Celtic and Roman Churches in Britain. At this Synod, Hilda argued for the defence of Celtic church customs, and although the argument was eventually lost, she accepted the decisions of the Synod with grace, and worked to unite the Church throughout the land.

The existence of a written form of Hilda's life, and her position as abbess of a double community show the importance of women at this stage of English Christian history. She was a woman of note and influence, asked for counsel by rulers, kings and ordinary people. She is reputed to have encouraged Caedmon to write

Christian poems – the first Christian poetry to be composed in English.

Now we must laud the heaven-kingdom's keeper, the Ordainers might and his mind's intent, the work of the Father of Glory: in that he, the Lord everlasting, appointed of each wonderous thing the beginning; he holy Creator, at the first created heaven for a roof to the children of men; he, mankind's Keeper, Lord everlasting, almighty Ruler, afterwards fashioned for mortals the middle earth, the world.
