#### **WILDERNESS TIME**

As I write this article, we are facing the prospect of having a new kitchen fitted. To say it is an experience that we are certainly not looking forward to, would be a massive understatement, as I am sure those of you who have faced similar upheavals will appreciate. The entire contents of



our old kitchen are packed away in boxes, nothing is where it should be, most rooms in the house are messed up in one way or another, and we are all at 'sixes and sevens'. When the work is actually being undertaken, life will not be normal (whatever that may mean!!!). However, because of certain issues with our kitchen, it is something which has to be done.

Lent is also 'something that has to be done' – a time of desolation which leads us up to the magnificence of Easter. I wrote in last month's article about the Lenten season and, as this year's month of March is consumed by it, I thought I would continue with the theme. Lent marks the forty days endured by Jesus in the wilderness.

On the first Sunday in Lent, at the end of February, Joyce Hansell gave the congregation a powerful, dramatised and interactive image of Jesus' wilderness experiences. With the help of our children and some adults, she used each letter of the word WILDERNESS to get the congregation to think of adjectives that might describe the feelings that Jesus felt during the time he was there. Words such as Wild, Inhospitable, Lonely, Desolate and so on. For those who matched the adjectives chosen by Joyce herself, they were rewarded with a chocolate bar (chocolate doesn't count on Sundays as they are feast days!!). I didn't get one, by the way!

It is a very thought provoking exercise to try this for yourselves, to find a word, using these letters, and apply it to your own lives. Then dwell for a while on how each of those words has made you feel over the years, whether those feelings and their repercussions have been of benefit to you, or have made you sad.

Mary Baker Eddy, the founder of Christian Science, describes the wilderness as: Wilderness: - Loneliness; Doubt; Darkness; Spontaneity of thought and idea; the Vestibule in which a material

sense of things disappears and spiritual sense unfolds the great facts of existence.

For Jesus, the wilderness was a place of desolation and loneliness, but as he showed us, it is the one place where he could not rely on material things for comfort; rather, it was the place where he drew closer to God through the temptations he suffered.

We all have our 'wilderness' time. Times where disappointment and failure get to us and yet, from which, we emerge with a clearer mind. Times of illness and bereavement, where the grace of God and the love and support of family and friends sees us through the darkest of days.

We are hoping that the fitting of our new kitchen will not take forty days but, even if it does, the end result should be worth all the inconvenience and effort. That, of course, is just materialistic and I hope and pray that all our lives will be enriched by a meditative Lent and we emerge at Easter feeling renewed and ready to celebrate, once again, the glorious resurrection of our Lord.

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#### The Real Easter Egg



Introduced in 2010, The Real Easter Egg was initially turned down by supermarkets as they were unsure that a 'faith egg' would sell. How wrong they were. Last year, in a national poll, the Real Easter Egg was voted the UK's favourite Fairtrade egg and now more than a million Real Easter Eggs have been sold!

The Real Easter Egg is still the only Fairtrade egg with a copy of the Easter story in each box. There is also a charitable donation for every 150g egg sold. More than £140,000 has been donated from sales. It also supports farmers and producers in the developing world by using Fairtrade chocolate.

The Real Easter Egg campaign aims to establish giving a Real Easter Egg as a tradition. They can be found in some supermarkets, however, very little is made from these sales and more can be made by direct sales from churches and schools. Last year more than 400,000 eggs were sent through the post. This is a very positive example of putting our faith into practice and it is hoped that churches will support this year's Real Easter Egg campaign.

Each year the content of the Real Easter Egg changes. This year blue egg has a unique 3ft storybook/banner, the Premium Peace Edition contains an olive wood key ring made in Bethlehem and there is a dairy free dark chocolate egg

#### St George's 175th Anniversary


As part of our 175th anniversary celebrations I am looking to make a display of St. George's over the years.

If you have any photos you are willing for me to include in the display, please can you let me have them and I will scan them and give them back.





#### Saint of the Month 20 March Cuthbert, Bishop of Lindisfarne, Missionary, 687

Cuthbert was born about 635, either in Northumberland or the Scottish borders where he was a shepherd in his youth. In the year 651, while watching over his sheep, he is said to have had a vision, but for whatever reason

he entered the religious life as a monk at Melrose Abbey. At Melrose, Cuthbert soon became eminent for his holiness and learning and was greatly involved in mission work in Galloway. After ten years at Melrose, a new monastery was founded at Ripon, and Cuthbert was sent there to be the guest-master, but these were the years of disagreement between the Celtic and Roman traditions of Christianity (the date of Easter was one of the most contentious points at issue) and in 661, when Ripon adopted the Roman usage, Cuthbert and other monks who favoured the Celtic usage returned to Melrose. Shortly after his return, he became prior.

In 664, the Synod of Whitby decided in favour of the Roman usage and committed the English Church to following the customs that had been introduced by Augustine. Cuthbert, who accepted the decision, was sent to be prior at Lindisfarne, in order that he might introduce the Roman customs into that house. This was a difficult matter which needed all his gentle tact and patience to carry out successfully, but he was able to minimize contention over the decision and the community remained united.

But Cuthbert felt a call to the solitary life and in 676, coveting a life of prayer and contemplation, he retired, with the abbot's permission, to a hermitage, first on the mainland (possibly near Howburn) then on Inner Farne, one of a small group of islands offshore from Bamburgh in Northumberland, where he gave himself up to a life of great austerity. Cuthbert was noted for the remarkable rapport he had with animals, both wild and domestic. Appropriately the island is today a bird sanctuary. In 684 he was elected Bishop of Hexham but refused to accept the post. The following year, however, he was he was elected Bishop of Lindisfarne, a post which he was eventually persuaded to accept. His brief episcopate of two years was marked with continuous missionary work and this almost certainly exhausted him. At Christmas, 686, foreseeing the approach of death, he resigned his see and returned to his cell on Inner Farne, where he died on 20 March 687.
