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

Dear Friends,

I want to begin by wishing you all a Happy Easter and hope that, if you are going away on holiday, you will have a relaxing and peaceful time and return refreshed in body, mind and spirit.



This month's article is an abridged version of my reflections over the past year, which were presented at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 17 March. Apologies to those who were present and, therefore, will have heard this before!

I want to begin by giving thanks to God for a year in which much has been achieved, difficulties have been overcome and, hopefully, we have all grown a little in grace.

Grateful thanks are due to our wardens, Gill and Derek, in their continuing support not just of me, but also of the whole of St George's. I am sure that you will agree with me, that we all owe a great deal to those who work so hard, week in, week out, in maintaining the building and the graveyard; in producing the pew sheet and the magazine; servicing the various committees and dealing with all the financial issues that arise. To the wonderful cleaning team and those who help in the kitchen each Sunday morning; to the sides people, the choir, the lesson readers, Eucharistic Assistants, servers, gift aid recorder, the junior Church leaders, the leaders of the youth organisations, the list goes on – everyone who does their little bit for St George's on a voluntary basis.

We were absolutely delighted to have been able to pay our Parish Share, in full, for the second year running - again, this would have been an impossible task without the support of everyone who has remained faithful and done their utmost to support St George's. We are indebted to everyone who has given so willingly of their time and skills.

Having paid the Parish Share in full has given us the opportunity to apply for various grants. We have been fortunate to receive the backing of the Diocesan Advisory Committee and the Archdeacon who have each provided us with letters of support for a grant towards the much needed work on the guttering and the roof. The outcome of this is still awaited. Each year brings sad farewells as well as new opportunities. In September we saw the departure of Keith and Juliana Stewart who had

been members of St. George's for the best part of forty years and, over that time, had fulfilled many roles between them and were such an integral part of our community. Keith had served as a Reader before being ordained and becoming our Ordained Local Minister and Juliana acted as the PCC Treasurer for quite a number of years. We miss their presence with us but wish them well in their new environment.

St. George's has had OLMs, Curates and Licensed Readers, for many years and I hope and pray that someone may feel able to continue this tradition and take on a more formal role within the church. If you believe that God may be calling you, please think and pray about it and come along for a chat.

In the early part of 2014, six of our older and very long standing congregation members died and we miss their presence with us very much. At Christmas we dedicated the gift of a large and beautiful Nativity Scene, given in memory of Enid Longden, and this has been greatly appreciated by many people.

We continue to have a large number of families coming for baptism but, unfortunately, they don't become regular attenders. This is, of course, not just peculiar to our church but, with an ageing congregation, it would be good to see more young families with us. All of us, I think, need to take time to encourage them to return to St George's when they come along with their families for the baptisms. That would be a real boost to the worshipping life of St George's.

For the first time we combined the Christingle Service with the Junior Church Nativity and held it within the context of the main morning service. It was an experiment which proved to be a wonderful occasion and the church was full with many non-regular attenders and a large number of children. The Junior Church excelled themselves with a very professional performance and the whole service was truly uplifting.

The PCC will be looking at how we might build a Mission Action Plan. Each church is required to look at how it could develop better strategies for mission and how to encourage church growth. There are now three sub-committees of the PCC - one to look at our worship, a second to look at pastoral care and the third to deal with social and fund raising events.

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Each of these sub-committees would welcome those who are not elected members of the PCC to attend any or all of their meetings.

Following the ingress of water on the north side of the building earlier in the year, repairs and re-decoration were carried out and the new carpet, for which we had been planning for some time, was finally laid at the turn of the year. Before too long, this will be complemented by new padded pew runners, paid for by sponsorship, donations and one large anonymous donation. The internal fabric of our building is now in excellent order as we begin this Anniversary year.

We now look forward to a year of great celebration of the 175th Anniversary of the consecration of the New St. George's building. We hope to hold a social event every month and the highlight of the year will be the Anniversary weekend itself. This will be an open weekend where old parish registers will be on display, there will be an Anniversary concert and Bishop Mark will celebrate and preach and join us for a Bring and Share Lunch. The weekend will culminate in a Songs of Praise evening.

I conclude, as I began, with grateful thanks to God for all the blessings and benefits He has bestowed on us over the past year.

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



Saint of the Month 27 April Christina Rossetti, Poet, 1894



Christina Rossetti, the youngest member of a remarkable artistic Anglo-Italian family, was born

in London in 1830. A devout Anglican from an evangelical background, Christina and her sister became greatly influenced by the Tractarians and her sister Maria eventually entered the sisterhood of All Saints', Margaret Street.

Some of Christina's earliest work, written under the pseudonym 'Ellen Alleyne', was published in *The Germ*, the organ of the pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood. Her poetry reflected her Christian faith and also a pervading sense of melancholy, both strong facets of her character. She also wrote fantasy poems and pieces for children, for example her 1862 work, *Goblin Market*. But this can also be interpreted as a religious allegory with themes of temptation, sin and redemption clearly apparent.

She gave up the prospect of marriage for religious reasons. She broke off her engagement to James Collinson in 1850 when he became a Roman Catholic and in 1866 she turned down a proposal from James Bagot Cayley. Not surprisingly the themes of renunciation of earthly love and the habitual Victorian concern with death are also recurring themes, particularly in her later poetry. Her poetry is recognized by critics as having a high degree of technical perfection and encompasses a wide range of styles and forms. Two Christmas carols, *In the bleak mid-winter* and *Love came down at Christmas*, remain popular today and are in many hymn books. At one point she was considered as a possible successor to Tennyson as Poet Laureate.

When her father's failing health and eyesight forced him into retirement in 1853, Christina and her mother attempted to support the family by starting their own school, but it was a short-lived venture. Her brother Dante's breakdown in 1872 and death ten years later affected her deeply. She herself suffered from chronic ill-health in later life and became something of a recluse. She developed cancer in 1891 and died three years later. Shortly before her death she published the poem 'None other Lamb', later put to music as a hymn:

None other Lamb; none other name, None other hope in heaven or earth or sea, None other hiding-place from guilt and shame, None beside Thee. My faith burns low, my hope burns low, Only my heart's desire cries out in me, By the deep thunder of its want and woe, Cries out to Thee.

Lord, Thou art life, though I be dead, Love's fire Thou art, however cold I be: Nor heaven have I, nor place to lay my head, Nor Home, but Thee.
