### 175th Anniversary - A Year In Review

As we approach the end of our 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year celebrations, I want to look back at the social events we have enjoyed and other happenings over the last twelve months.



We began the year in January, not with a social event, but with the laying of new carpet throughout the worship area.

This replaced the one laid down almost thirty years ago and which was showing signs of wear and tear. Hopefully the new carpet will last us equally as long.

January, too, was the month for our traditional Senior Citizens' Party. This was held on 24th January and was enjoyed, not only by those who were invited, and those who took part in the entertainment, but also by the helpers behind the scenes. We are very grateful to all who work hard each year to make these parties so successful.

In February, some sixty members of the church went for a Celebratory Sunday Lunch at Stamford Golf Club. It proved so popular that we have just rounded off the year with a repeat Sunday lunch, in November, at the same venue. Many thanks to Stamford Golf Club for their hospitality.

On 20th March, a good number of us went Ten Pin Bowling at Hollywood Bowl in Ashton. Martyn Corcoran was the overall individual winner with the highest score and he was awarded a bottle of wine for his efforts. His team were also the highest scorers and each member was given one of our Anniversary Pens. We hope to repeat this very enjoyable evening during 2016.

During March we received the fantastic news that we had been awarded a substantial grant from the Listed Places of Worship Scheme to help with the much needed repairs to the roof and guttering. We are very grateful to the church members who put together our application for the grant and to the group who are working with our new Architects to set the work in motion.

The April event took place, appropriately, on St George's Day. The weather was absolutely perfect and a very small but happy group caught the Folk Train at Guide Bridge station, for a ride up to Glossop. Whilst there might have been only six of us from St George's, the live music group, Klezmer Collective, a traditional Jewish band, obviously had a big following with a large number walking from Glossop railway station to Glossop Labour Club to continue listening to them there. Afterwards, the band played on the return train journey back to Manchester Piccadilly.

Our Spring Fair in May, is always a pleasant day out and this year was no exception. In addition to all the usual stalls we held our Grand Prize Raffle Draw which brought in, very successfully, some much needed funds. Again, thanks to all those who supported the Fair in any way.

In June, we celebrated our Anniversary weekend in style. The church held an Open Day and visitors came along to look at all the historic photographs kindly lent to us by parishioners both past and present. Having borrowed, from Manchester Central Library, all the Archive registers of baptisms, weddings and funerals for both Old and New St George's, people could research a bit of their family history and this proved very popular. There was also a montage of photographs of past Rose Queens and their retinues. We were treated on the Saturday evening to a wonderful musical extravaganza, courtesy of Tameside Community Voices, who just go from strength to strength.

On the Sunday, we were delighted to have as our president and preacher, our area bishop, the Right Reverend Mark Davies, to make the event even more memorable. This was followed by a Bring and Share Lunch and, in the evening, by a Songs of Praise service.

To further enhance the internal fabric of the building, June saw the arrival of new padded seat cushions for the pews. These were financed by physical effort and some very generous donations and have proved to be most comfortable and welcome.

One event was organised especially with the children in mind. Following the Junior Church Prizegiving in July, the sporty ones amongst us, met in Cheetham's Park for a Picnic in the Park and a game of rounders. Because of baptisms, I was a little late arriving and sadly never got a chance to bat, but did manage to field and throw a very good ball back to the base keeper, who wasn't too thrilled, considering I hit her on the head! No damage done, though, thank goodness.

The Ascot Ladies day, our August event, once again, proved a huge success, with the ladies turning up in all their finery for a sumptuous afternoon tea. Sadly, our Crown Green Bowling challenge, also planned for August, had to be cancelled due to lack of support.

We held a Beetle Drive in September aimed at families and supported mainly by our Brownies and their parents.

October saw quite a few of us whisked off to top Mossley for an excellent walking Treasure Trail, whilst later in the month, we held a Race Night. This latter evening was not very well supported in terms of numbers attending, but was extremely profitable financially and much enjoyed by the participants. Again many thanks to the organisers of these events for all their hard work.

Unforeseen circumstances meant that the planned Parish Revue scheduled for October had to be postponed at short notice. A new date for this will be announced shortly.

Last month we held our Christmas Fair, and managed to get Santa Claus to spend some time with us, hot foot from Lapland. All who visited him in

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his wonderful grotto were awestruck. Thanks to all who helped in any way to run the Fair and made sure that Santa returned home safely.

Throughout the year, we have held a monthly Fair Trade afternoon tea – a lovely opportunity for a relaxed natter, and most months have seen our fun quizzes. The team who win set the questions for the following month and there is usually a wide spectrum of subjects. The next quiz is scheduled for Saturday 30 January 2016 at 8.00pm.

Each year inevitably brings sorrow when we lose faithful members of our congregation. In May and in June we were saddened by the deaths of Ken Bradshaw and Ethel Barber. Ken had been involved for many years with the Boys Brigade and Ethel with the Cubs and her cakes on the home-bake stalls were legendary.

Towards the end of the year we had our Quinquennial (five yearly) inspection of all aspects of the church building. This highlighted more problems than we had anticipated and also brought about the realisation that our generous grant would only be sufficient to fund quite a small part of all the necessary repair work. We are hopeful though that we will, once again, meet this year's Diocesan Quota obligation, which qualifies us to seek further funding and, of course, our own efforts to raise funds to keep our building in good order are ongoing.

It has been a pleasure during the year to welcome some new members to our church family from All Saints, Micklehurst which, most sadly, had to close its doors. We realise what a blow this must have been to them, but do hope that they soon feel at home here and want to stay for many years to come.

Very many thanks go to our small but willing band of volunteers whose ongoing work week in, week out, keep our services and the building and all that goes on within it, functioning so well. Some of the tasks that are undertaken are seen, but many are not and without the tireless efforts of these men and women we would be so much the poorer.

It has been a good year and with God's grace we look forward in hope to the challenges he sets for us in 2016.



### Saint of the Month

### 7 December Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, Teacher of the Faith, 397

Born in Trier 337/9 and brought up in a Christian family, Ambrose was recommended as bishop in 374. Although he was a Christian he had not yet been baptized. After he accepted the position

Ambrose received baptism, ordination and consecration as bishop within a single week. His election as bishop is a testimony to his ability in government and his personal integrity. The Church in Milan was torn between two opposing theologies concerning the nature of Christ. The Arian party denied the full divinity of Christ, whilst the anti-Arian (or orthodox) party affirmed it. The two parties could not agree on a candidate for bishop and the argument spilled over into civil unrest. Ambrose was the only candidate both parties could agree on.

In the debate, Ambrose initially followed the decrees of the Emperor who was an Arian supporter. However he soon started to act for the defence of orthodoxy and pursued an anti-Arian agenda in his appointments and social affairs. One famous anti-Arian event occurred in 386 when the Arian party requested a church building in which to conduct their worship. Although agreed by the Emperor, the request was refused by Ambrose and he underlined the refusal by occupying the requested building with his whole congregation. The occupation lasted from Palm Sunday to Easter Day, and the time was passed by the singing of songs. It was the origin of Ambrosian chant in which hymns drew content from the religious events, rather than just Scripture. A prolific hymn writer, Ambrose became known as the founder of liturgical hymnody in the Western Church.

Ambrose had many disagreements with the Emperor Theodosius. Although a Christian, Theodosius had difficulty ruling his empire in a Christian manner, often blindly following the advice of his largely pagan court and occasionally overreacting in a violent manner to quell public unrest. In 390 Ambrose's power over Theodosius was demonstrated. The people of Thessalonica murdered one of Theodosius' senior officers. The Emperor had the citizens invited to the Circus and then sent in soldiers to massacre them. Records note that in three hours 6,000 citizens lost their lives. Ambrose's response was to withdraw the Eucharist from the Emperor, until he had performed public penance. Ambrose constantly challenged him over his behaviour and his policies, and pushed the boundaries of church influence deeper and deeper into the role of the State. In all this, Ambrose's main weapon was the withholding of the Eucharist from the Emperor and through this threat, Ambrose claimed for the Church the right of veto over the decisions of the State.

Ambrose was a staunch defender of the Church in a time of theological unrest and debate. He was unwilling to compromise the Church's position in society. He was also willing to act for the State, making several peace missions, and intervening in civil unrest on more than one occasion. Ambrose demanded integrity in leadership from the governing class, and from the Emperor in particular. He stated quite plainly that 'the Emperor is in the Church, not over it'. He died two years after Theodosius, on Good Friday 397.

Ambrose's 'Hymn for the time of Advent' shows how he could combine doctrine and song to produce images of theological beauty:

> Redeemer of the nations come, That we may taste the virgin's fruit And every age in wonder gaze On such a birth, worthy of God! No earthly father's seed played here, But mystic Breath touched holy virgin womb: The Word of God took human form And human flesh blossomed divine.
