

On the battlefield of Ypres, the famous poem 'In Flanders Field' was written, inspired by the thousands of poppies which were growing there. The poem encouraged an American teacher, Moina Michael to start making silk poppies and selling them to friends in order to raise funds for those in the ex-service community. As with most things that start in America, before long, the idea came across the water, and in 1921 the Royal British Legion was formed by Earl Haig and the poppy became the symbol of the Legion.

The first ever 'Poppy Appeal' in the UK that year raised a fantastic sum of over £106,000 for war veterans, and the following year saw the setting up of a "Poppy Factory" to provide jobs for disabled former service personnel. The dream of its founder, Major George Howson MC, was "to give the disabled their chance". This was because thousands of wounded soldiers, sailors and airmen were



returning from the Great War but coming home to no means of earning a living.

The Poppy Factory is in Richmond, Surrey, where thirty of the workers (70% of the workforce) are disabled or suffer from chronic illness. Not only do they make individual poppies, but they make wreaths as well. Building on its strong foundations, it provides exceptional support to hundreds of ex-Service personnel every year. Since the end of the Second World War more than twelve thousand British servicemen and women have been killed or injured on active service

We will be remembering the fallen in our services on 13th November and will keep the two minute silence in honour of those who gave their lives in the service of their country.

Earlier in the month, on 6th November at 3.00pm, we at St George's, will also be remembering our loved ones who have passed from this life to the next, and you are invited to come along to this moving service and light a candle in their memory.





Saint of the Month 25 November Isaac Watts, Hymn Writer, 1748

Isaac Watts was born in Southampton in 1674 and educated at the grammar school there. Having considerable academic ability he came to the attention of a local benefactor who offered to send him to university. But rather than Anglican Oxford

or Cambridge, Watts chose the highly regarded Dissenting Academy at Stoke Newington in Middlesex. Leaving there in 1694 he worked first as a private tutor before entering the Independent ministry, first as assistant in 1699, then three years later as pastor of Mark Lane Chapel in London.

Because of deteriorating health he resigned his ministry at Mark Lane in 1712 and retired to Abney Park, Stoke Newington, where for the remaining 36 years of his life he lived under the patronage of the Abney family. Here his limited financial independence allowed him the freedom to write and yet he was said to have given away to the poor a third of his modest allowance. Watts has sometimes been accused of harbouring Unitarian sympathies but this was probably an inaccurate inference from his known opposition to a proposal in 1719 to require Nonconformist ministers to subscribe to the doctrine of the Trinity. It would appear to have been the proposed compulsion rather than the doctrine itself that he opposed.

Physically unprepossessing, it was his serene and spiritual manner and his unswerving faith that endeared him to others and is reflected in the words of many of his hymns. In fact, he wrote over six hundred hymns, though few of these are now in regular use. Among his hymns still sung are *Jesus shall reign* where'er the sun, Joy to the world and, one of the finest English hymns of any age, When I survey the wondrous cross.

Known as the father of English hymn writing, Watts both continued in the tradition of metrical Psalms (e.g. Psalm 90 - O *God, our help in ages past*) and began a general move away from that rather limited musical diet to a richer variety of hymnody that took root in both Nonconformity and the Church of England.

See from His head, His hands, His feet, Sorrow and love flow mingled down: When did such love and sorrow meet, Or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were an offering far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all!
