Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Hello! I'm your new vicar Revd Denise Owen. I'm sure you all know that I was licensed on September 14th in a really beautiful service. So first of all, a big 'Thank You' to everyone who organised the licensing, took part,

provided the refreshments and did anything else to make the evening so special. Another 'Thank You' to everyone who has given a welcome card or gift. I'm so grateful to you all.

I've had such a warm welcome into the churches and met so many lovely people already, I feel very blessed to be ministering to and with you.

Now, you may notice that I wrote with as well as to in that last sentence, because that's incredibly important for us all to remember. As Christians and disciples of Christ we all have a vocation and ministry, even if we may be a little bit wary of saying, or even acknowledging those words. 

Sunday 29th October - Bible Sunday

At the recent coronation the King was given a Bible with the words 'the most valuable thing that this world affords'. As Bible Sunday is celebrated this month, let's ask why we should read the Bible?

The Bible isn't a single book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over 1500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking the end times). Despite having a number of different writers, it claims one authority - God Himself! 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and equips us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us when we read: 'when the Spirit of truth comes, He will quide you into all truth' (John 16:13).

How should we read the Bible? Let's consider the following guidelines:

Right time: We need a regular routine, which will meet our needs. This will vary according to our circumstances e.g. a mum at home with young children, somebody with a demanding job or a retired person.

Right Place: We need to find a space where we can be undisturbed (e.g. lounge, bedroom, train or kitchen).

Right Version: We need a version of the Bible which we can readily understand and use. A number of versions are available (e.g. NIV, The Message), as well as Bible apps we can access on our phone.

Right Help: Reading notes also help us to understand a passage and apply it to our lives.

Let's get reading!!




