Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,



I'm writing this having just returned from two weeks holiday. I spent the first week on the Greek island of Kephalonia and I had a lovely relaxing time. On the day after I arrived there was a celebration in the small town square which involved a brass band, the school children from the local schools and the parish priests. It was a celebration of the time when the island officially became part of Greece.

There was a wreath laying ceremony and speeches, which I couldn't understand of course. What struck me about the celebration was the fact that the Church was integral to the ceremony. There was a service in the church which lasted for about an hour and a half before people gathered for the civic part of the celebration. The priests attended this as well. They prayed at the beginning of the ceremony. There appeared to be no separation between the 'religious' aspect of the event and the 'secular' aspect. I can't say that this is the norm in Greece, but it seemed to indicate that Christianity and the Church was an accepted part of everyday life.

This seems to me quite different to the situation in this country. We, of course, do have Christian elements in many of our national commemorations, Remembrance Day for example, but it is becoming less and less a part of our national and local lives. People are forgetting how much Christianity, and the Church have contributed to the life of this country, and they are increasingly antagonistic to any big commemoration which has a Christian element to it.

I think it's time for us as the Church, and the leadership of the Church to be more forthright and confident in speaking about the Chirstian heritage of this country. A heritage which is positive and life affirming. I mean this, not in a nationalistic or party -political way, but in the way that Christian values have shaped our history and values. When I think of Christian values I have in mind justice, care for those in need, generosity and understanding towards those who are different from us, among others. I also think about the many Church of England schools that were established to educate the poor which is something I think that we should be very proud of. I could think of any number of organisations and charities that had a Christian foundation, you may be able to name some yourself.

Anyway, I'm going to conclude this by saying I am aware that the term Christian values can be misused and distorted especially in the context I'm writing about. If we truly believe in the importance of Christian values then we, of course, look to Christ, and consider his example of love, mercy and compassion

The Nicene Creed



This year marks 1700 years since the first version of the Nicene Creed was agreed. The Nicene Creed is the long Creed that we recite together in church during Holy Communion. It begins like this:

> We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

The Nicene Creed is one of the foundational statements of Christian belief, shared across most Christian traditions. It was first agreed at the Council of Nicaea in AD 325, a gathering of bishops from across the Christian world convened by the Emperor Constantine. The Council sought to resolve disputes about the identity of Jesus Christ and affirmed that he is "of one being with the Father". The Creed was expanded in its present form at the First Council of Constantinople in AD 381. It sets out the Church's faith in the Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Spirit - and has been recited in Christian worship down the centuries as a shared declaration of belief, unity and hope.

The Church of England has produced resources for churches to go deeper into the Nicene Creed.

Why Do We Do That?

- 1. Why do we say 'Amen' so often? I'm sure you all know that 'Amen' is a word we use in church to agree with something that has been prayed. It's a way of saying 'Yes' or 'So be it' at the end of a prayer. I find it particularly meaningful when the congregation says 'Amen' at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer. During this prayer it is the priest who is saying the words out loud, reminding us of the saving acts of Christ and asking the Holy Spirit to come and transform the sacred elements of bread and wine. It's a fairly long prayer, and the congregation of course is expected to be listening attentively and prayerfully. The 'Amen' that comes at the end is the congregation verbally assenting to and agreeing with what has been said and prayed.
- 2. You may have seen that during the Eucharistic Prayer the bread, also called the host, and the wine in the chalice are lifted up. This is called the elevation, and it comes at a particular point in the Praver. The bread is elevated just after the priest has said the words used by Jesus at the Last Supper. 'Take eat. This is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me'. The wine is elevated just after the words, 'Drink this all, of you; this is my blood...etc'. Why are the host and the wine elevated? Well, the elevation or the lifting up are a sign that Christ was 'lifted up' on the cross. The sacrifice he made on the cross and the words he spoke to the disciples at that final meal come together at this point in the service. So, this action is a reminder of his sacrifice. It's also a reminder of the glory he now shares with his heavenly Father; he was lifted up to heaven at the ascension. It may also remind to us of our invitation to share in the benefits of his saving death by doing what he asked us to do at the Last Supper which is eating and drinking his body and blood at Holy Communion.

Saint George's Church is much more than just Sunday!

As part of our mission, we aim to love and serve our community. We express this by inviting individuals to enter our church and ensuring they receive a warm and welcoming reception upon arrival.

Through the week, we open our doors for a wonderful array of groups and events, each designed to nurture connections and create a sense of belonging. These initiatives are at the heart of our commitment to building a caring and inclusive community.

On Mondays and Thursdays, we offer a Tiny Tots group specifically for pre-school children and their carers. This provides a secure and inviting environment for young children to engage in play while allowing carers the opportunity to foster connections with one another. This initiative is part of our broader goal to cultivate meaningful relationships within our community. There is no requirement to book in advance; just turn up. The sessions run from 9am to 11am during term time.

On Tuesdays, we offer a midweek service tailored for those who prefer a quieter atmosphere or are unable to join us on Sundays. This service, entirely spoken without hymns, begins at 10:30am. Please be aware that to reach the church, you will pass through the lounge area, where Safe Space meetings are held. This service reflects our commitment to making worship accessible to everyone in our community.

On Tuesday mornings, Saint George's opens its doors for a Safe Space group, led by Rod Waddington, where mental health and life skills take centre stage. This group fosters a supportive atmosphere for individuals seeking growth, connection, and understanding as they navigate life's challenges. Participants can engage in discussions, share experiences, and learn practical strategies to enhance their wellbeing, ensuring they leave feeling empowered and cared for. The group truly embodies the church's mission of love and service, offering a sanctuary for personal reflection and communal support.

Tuesday evenings add to the vibrancy of the day with a Zumba class starting at 6:30pm. Open to everyone regardless of fitness levels, this energetic session is both fun and inclusive. Led by Ria, who ensures participants' safety by asking them to complete a simple questionnaire regarding medical conditions and fitness levels, the class aims to bring people together in movement and joy. There is no charge, and newcomers are warmly welcome—either simply turn up or contact Ria on 07933107985 for further details.

On Wednesdays, we host Brownies and Guides, creating a welcoming and safe environment for girls to connect, learn, and grow. Guiding offers a wonderful opportunity for girls to develop various skills, including baking, arts and crafts, and exploring the great outdoors. The Brownies group meets from 6:30pm to 7:45pm, followed by the Guides group, which runs from 7:30pm to 8:30pm. These overlapping times allow for a smooth transition between the groups and foster a sense of continuity and community. Whether it's through teamwork, creativity, or adventure, these sessions aim to inspire and empower girls as they discover their potential and build lasting friendships.

On Thursdays, we host our Chatty Café from 1pm to 3pm. 11,000 people take part in consultations for the next Archbishop of Canterbury More than 11,000 people have so far participated in the consultations for the

next Archbishop of Canterbury. It was carried out online, by post and in person between February and March this year.

The public consultation was a unique opportunity to influence the future of leadership within the Church, helping to discern the gifts, skills and qualities that will be required in the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury, to meet the needs of the Church today and in the years to come.

The themes that emerge through this consultation will sit alongside the 'Statement of Needs' produced by the Diocese of Canterbury, as well as other information provided by the National Church and Anglican Communion. This information will inform the Canterbury Crown Nominations Commission of the needs of the mission of the Church of England and the wider Anglican Communion.
