Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As many of you know, before I was ordained, I was a teacher in primary schools for many years. I got used to a different rhythm of time across the year, so for me September always feels like the beginning of something new.

When I was teaching September meant the end of the long summer holiday and the start of a new school year. I used to enjoy going into the school for a few days in the last weeks of the holiday to get things in the classroom ready. New names, new books, new children to get to know, sometimes new colleagues, it was always an exciting time.

September still has that feel for me even now, although I left teaching over a decade ago. It still feels like a month that has lots of possibilities. We see the season move towards autumn, the weather become cooler, and the nights continue to draw in. New things begin or things start up again.

'Newness' is something I often think about in relation to my faith. St Paul tells us that when we choose to follow Christ, we are a new creation, 'the old has gone, the new has come'. 

IHS



Have you ever wondered what these letters mean?

This is a photo of an altar frontal from St George's, Stalybridge but you may have seen something similar at St George's, Mossley or St John's, Roughtown. You find the letters IHS embroidered on falls hanging from lecterns, on stoles, carved into church furniture and in various different places in church. It isn't a misspelling of HIS. These three letters are actually the first three letters of the name 'Jesus', the word 'Jesus' in shorthand if you like, but seen through the lens of Greek and Latin. In Greek, which is the language the New Testament was written in, the word 'Jesus' looks like this: $IH\Sigma Y\Sigma$. I should also say that the very earliest versions of the New Testament were written in capital letters. You can probably see the I (J) and H (E) but what about the S? This is basically a confusion of the two letters 'Σ' and 'S'. They both make the same sound and in the Roman world of the New Testament, educated people would have spoken and written both Latin and Greek. It just so happens that at some point in the early years of the church the mix-up in the letters became embedded in the symbols and imagery associated with Jesus. IHΣ became IHS. So IHS doesn't mean anything in itself, it's a mixture of Latin and Greek letters which we see in many churches in the Western world, and which point us towards Jesus.

Why Do We Do That?

I've been asked very recently about some of the responses we make in church during our service, and whether they change or stay the same through out the year. You'll all know that the colours in church change according to the liturgical season, but so do some of the prayers and introductions. You may notice that the Eucharistic Prayer which is the long prayer the priest prays at the altar over the elements changes to match the season, so in Advent the Prayer anticipates the coming of the Christ child, and during the Christmas season the Prayer celebrates his arrival.

Other elements of the liturgy also change such as the Introductions to the Confession and Peace and the closing Blessing. These seasonal changes are meant to reflect the 'mood' of the season. In Lent the mood would be sombre and penitential, at Easter, the mood is celebratory and joyful. For example, here is the Introduction to the Peace for Lent:

Since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us access to his grace.

And here is the Introduction to the Peace for Easter:

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said, 'Peace be with you.'

Then were they glad when they saw the Lord. Alleluia.

During our current season which is Trinity or Ordinary Time, the president, or person who is presiding at the service, can choose which one of a number of Introductions or Blessings to use, perhaps based on the readings for the day or the theme of the sermon.

In general, although not always, the responses the congregation makes remain the same throughout the year. There is a lot of choice in the modern Church of England liturgies.




Likewise, bedmakers might be debunked, bulldozer operators degraded, organ donors delivered, software engineers detested, and underwear manufacturers debriefed?

A SURPRISE VISITOR!

We had a surprise visitor at one of our Dementia Cafes last month! A Harris Hawk came to pay us a call! One of our Volunteers, Margaret was in the church grounds one day when she met Gary who was exercising the hawk in our churchyard. He lives locally and often takes the opportunity to exercise Phoenix around our church. They started chatting and she told him about our Dementia Café – and the rest as they say, is history!

I was a little confused as to how this would turn out – did he want us to take our guests outside? I couldn't imagine the bird being comfortable inside? How wrong I was! Gary brought her before our guests arrived to give us a sneak preview. She is such a beautiful bird and extremely well trained.

After lunch they arrived to the astonishment of our guests! I couldn't believe how eager they all were to hold her! The knack is to keep the bird on the glove and to slide your hand inside it. Our guests and their carers were quite literally queueing up to hold her! The calming effect that Phoenix had on our guests was amazing to see; those who have anxiety issues were perfectly comfortable and calm with her.

Gary gave us lots of information on caring for Phoenix; her food, her flying regime and the part she plays in his work. If she is too light he is unable to let her fly as she would leave him to go hunting for food and would not return to him (he lost her for a week once!) too heavy and she won't fly so her diet and weight are constantly assessed.

She was perfectly behaved and our guests were absolutely in awe of her. I have lots of photos which I will display on the noticeboard for a short time. We can't wait to welcome her back again!

September - New Beginnings by Canon Paul Hardingham

September is the time of year when we get back to our routines after the summer break. As whole-life disciples (lit: *learners*) we are all called to learn from Jesus and live like Him. God wants us to make a difference in our workplaces and schools, and with family and friends. As Paul writes:

'And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him.' (Colossians 3:17).

'WHATEVER you do': God is at work in every aspect of our lives. He can use whatever we do to make a difference to those around. Do we believe this? Our lives shouldn't be like an orange, segmented into the sacred and secular, but more like an apple, in which all of our lives are available to Him.

'Whatever YOU do': God wants to use us to share God's love as we serve others around us, wherever we spend time. We can trust Him for the resources we need hour by hour, day by day, year by year. What do we need from Him?

'Whatever you DO': We work for God alone, in responding to God's love for us. How does this perspective make a difference when what we do is hard, unrewarding, or even unappreciated by others?

A man standing on a train platform was asked one day: 'Who are you?' He replied, 'I am a Christian thinly disguised as an accountant.' If we were asked the same question ourselves, how would we respond? As disciples of Jesus Christ, our identity is rooted in God and His call upon our lives. For each of us, September means learning from Jesus about how we might live for Him in the different places we find ourselves.
