


Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As I write this, I've just returned from a school harvest celebration service. There were songs, poems and prayers. There was a message about caring for others and caring for the earth, and there was a message about being thankful. The children sang beautifully and the young people who led the worship were incredibly

confident. I really enjoyed it. It was a joyful celebration full of enthusiasm and hope. This is a reminder to me of how important it is to welcome children into church. It was a school harvest service so there were almost two hundred children plus teachers and families in church. The pews were full and even though the church wasn't very warm everyone had fun and went home or back to school blessed. What a wonderful vision for our churches. Imagine if in all our churches on a Sunday morning we had children, young people and families coming together to worship God and giving thanks for what Jesus has done.

I'm sure this is something we all hope and pray for, and it's something we're working towards. Welcoming new people, families with young children as well as older people is something we can all do. When new people come to church, especially parents or carers with children, it can be quite intimidating. It can feel as though there's a right way to behave or sit or stand or kneel or whatever it might be. Parents and carers may feel they've got to keep their children quiet or make them sit still. It can be hard. As churches we need to make sure our focus is on making people feel welcome and as though they belong with us. We should be thanking God that people want to give church a try and not worry to much about what is right or wrong in church. If there's sometimes noise or children are moving around the church, that's something we have to accept. We can certainly be examples of what to do in church, but only if we are examples which are full of love and compassion. Jesus welcomed children and blessed them, and we must do the same.

I wish everyone could have experienced the harvest service as I have just done. It filled my heart with joy and hope and taught me once again to be thankful for all the wonderful things God has given us and especially for children and young people who are so enthusiastic about singing hymns and songs of worship.



St George's Flag

You'll probably have seen St George's flags flying from lampposts around near where we live in the past few weeks. You may have seen this being reported in the news. People seem to be displaying these flags out of a sense of patriotism or a wish to affirm an English identity. I'm not going to comment on the motives of

what's happening with these flags, but I am going to talk briefly about our response as Christians.

I've taken the image above from a free online photo provider and it's a photograph of a flag flying from the top of a church just like we have at St Geoge's in Mossley. For us as Christians this flag is a symbol of what we believe about God and God's people as much as it is a national flag. That's why they are flown above churches dedicated to St George. It is for the Church a symbol of God's power to vanquish evil, which in the story of St George was in the form of a dragon. Whatever we think about these flags flying on our streets we should always bear in mind that we follow a man who loved and welcomed strangers and foreigners. He healed and spoke to people who were not Jewish and who were not seen as part of the Biblical heritage of the children of God. Jesus showed us that we should love and respect all people.

If the flags that are being flown around our towns and cities carry a message that certain people and groups of people are unwelcome or not 'legitimate' then as Christians, we must be very careful. We must be very careful about using language which dehumanises others and seems to contradict the fact that we are all equally loved and valued by God. Jesus came to teach us that everyone is a child of God, and that everyone is made in God's image. When we hear or read words which seem to undermine that Christian message or to devalue people then we have to say that that is profoundly unchristian.

There is absolutely nothing wrong with being patriotic, or being proud of the flag of St George and there is a great deal that is wonderful about our country, but we shouldn't love those things and be proud of those things at the expense of valuing and loving other people.

The Collect for the Seventeenth Sunday after Trinity

Almighty God,
you have made us for yourself,
and our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you:
pour your love into our hearts and draw us to yourself,
and so bring us at last to your heavenly city
where we shall see you face to face;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

In the last magazine I wrote about a prayer after communion which I had found very helpful and suggested that you might use it in your own prayers. This month I've been struck by this collect. It's based on some famous words attributed to St Augustine in his book *Confessions*. St Augustine was a fascinating man. He was born in the fourth century AD in what is now Algeria and after a 'tumultuous youth' he eventually gave his life to Christ and became bishop of Hippo. He was a theologian and philosopher and one of his most famous sayings or more accurately phrases is found in this collect:

our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you.

Augustine saw in those around him a sense of restlessness or unease, and a lack of peace that he knew only God could heal. He had experienced this restlessness himself having experimented with a variety of philosophies as well as a hedonistic lifestyle before he became a Christian. It was only when he had become a Christian that he found true peace, purpose and ultimately contentment. How many people around us have a similar restlessness of spirit although they may not acknowledge or even recognise it? People look for peace or fulfilment in so many different places all of which they will leave them wanting in the end. This collect reminds us that only God, the God who made us and loved us, can truly satisfy our greatest hopes and desires. It's another beautiful prayer and I commend it to you.


