



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I've been thinking a lot recently about those words at the beginning of Genesis when God sees what God has made and says, 'It is good' and 'It is very good'. I've preached about these words and spent time trying to understand what they mean for me at the moment. I've been especially interested in how I can say those words with no 'but' at the end. 'It is good, *but* I am aware of this issue whatever it may be which means it isn't completely good.' I've realised that I've been trying to balance the goodness of God and God's creation with the many injustices I see in the world.

This has made me wonder whether any of you have a similar experience. I believe God speaks to us all at various times and in different ways about many different things. Do you have a verse from the Bible or hymn or a few words from a church service that have stayed with you? Words that may be very familiar but suddenly seem to take on a new significance. Words that you repeat to yourself and are not sure why. This is one way God speaks to me and perhaps it's a way God speaks to you as well.

We are in Lent, and amid all the 'giving up' of things that is part of our discipline of fasting, there is also an important and ongoing discipline of attentiveness to God. Attentiveness isn't something we do during Lent or Advent and then put aside, it's something we should be doing as often as possible, in fact, we should be attentive to God all the time.

This might sound exhausting, but it could be as simple as being aware of the type of thing I've mentioned above. There could be a little niggle that we can't let go of and which if we spend a little time thinking, or even better, praying about it, we find that God is speaking.

So, I hope your Lent is proving to be holy, disciplined and joyful. I also hope you believe God speaks to you, in fact, that God is speaking to you in ways that you find both challenging and comforting.

Mothering Sunday - Sunday 15th March

Mothering Sunday is a day of mixed emotions. For many it's a happy, joyous day, but for others it's one of pain and grief. A day to celebrate love, while acknowledging those who cannot have children or have lost them and those who have no relationship with their mother.

In the dying moments of His life, Jesus honored Mary his mother by showing her love and care. He entrusted His mother to John's protection: *'When Jesus saw His mother there, and the disciple whom He loved standing nearby, He said to her, 'Woman, here is your son,' and to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.'* From that time on, this disciple took her into his home.' (John 19:26,27). While affirming the importance of mothers, Jesus reminds us that the love we show on Mothering Sunday is just a token of our continuous appreciation of them.

Jesus also creates a new way of being family, marking the beginnings of the church. In the past, people would go back to their *'mother'* church on this Sunday, to acknowledge its importance in their lives. Jesus invites us into this new family of love and mutual belonging, where we can find a place, irrespective of our own family circumstances.

Church is not always an easy place to be, because we are shaped by our own experience of mothering. We may find it hard to give or receive love without ourselves getting in the way. However, God's help is available to change things, *'because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.'* (Romans 5:5)

The mother of three difficult youngsters was asked whether she'd have children if she had it to do over again. *'Yes,'* she replied. *'But not the same ones.'*

Have you ever wondered what happens at a PCC Meeting?

What follows is a light hearted view of what happens at PCC meetings across the land. Taken from the Facebook page of Saint Faithful's Havenot. St Faithful's is a fictional parish, imagined by a real-life parish priest. It reflects familiar church cultures, observed with affection and humour. I hope you enjoy!

WHAT HAPPENS AT A PCC?

For those who may (HOPEFULLY) be considering standing for the PCC in April, I have been asked to provide a brief and honest account of what actually happens at a Parochial Church Council meeting. This is so that no one may later claim they were "not warned".

Let me first clear up a common misunderstanding. PCC stands for Parochial Church Council. It's a different thing entirely from the Parish Council - which is concerned, mainly, with granting planning permission for extensions, and arranging for dog-poo bins at the Rec to be emptied. There is no formal link between the two councils - for which we are eternally grateful.

A PCC meeting begins, in theory, with prayer. This is usually sincere, occasionally moving, and sometimes delivered while several members are still rummaging urgently in bags for their glasses, a pen, or the agenda they printed but have somehow lost between the church door and the chair they are now sitting on.

The minutes of the previous meeting are then approved. This takes longer than you might think, given that no one remembers the previous meeting in any detail, except for the one point that affected THEM personally, which they remember vividly and slightly differently from how it is written.

Corrections are suggested. Corrections to the corrections are suggested. At least one person says "I don't think it matters, really". It does. Otherwise we wouldn't be doing this.

Matters arising follow. These are matters which arose at the previous meeting and were confidently assigned to someone who is now looking faintly startled to discover this has not gone away on its own.

Finance is next. At this point, several people lean forward, several people lean back, and one person develops a sudden and intense interest in the ceiling. There will be numbers. There will be acronyms. There will be at least one sentence beginning "What you have to understand is...", followed by something that no one understands at all.

Someone will then ask whether this means we are "doing terribly" or "actually not too badly, all things considered". The answer will be "both".

Safeguarding is then addressed. Everyone becomes very serious. This is good. No jokes are made. No jokes should be made. This is not a funny topic.

Buildings come next. This section lasts forever.

The church roof is discussed. The heating is discussed. Something that was fixed last year is now mysteriously broken again. At least one sentence will contain the phrase “It’s only temporary”, referring to something that has been temporary since approximately 2007.

Mission and ministry are discussed. This is where we remind ourselves why we are here. It is also where someone says “We really should be doing more about...”, followed by something which everyone agrees is important, but which no one is quite sure who should actually do.

Someone suggests a sub-group. Everyone else looks frightened.

Any Other Business follows. This is not, as the title suggests, small incidental matters. This is where the REAL ISSUES emerge. This is where someone remembers something crucial that they forgot to mention earlier. This is where strong opinions surface about candles, notices, coffee, chairs, flowers, or the Vicar’s tone of voice when saying “Let us pray”.

The meeting ends with prayer. This prayer is shorter.

People leave feeling tired, oddly bonded, slightly exasperated, and faintly surprised that the Church of England continues to function at all.

And yet — and I say this with only moderate sentimentality — this is the Body of Christ at work. Different parts. Different gifts. Different tolerances for spreadsheets and prolonged discussion about radiators. It’s sometimes clumsy. Often frustrating. Occasionally hilarious. But still, somehow, a body. Still turning up. Still caring. Still trying to discern together what faithfulness looks like in this place, at this time.

If, having read this, you are still considering standing for the PCC in April — wonderful.

Please see me after church tomorrow. I have forms. And biscuits.





Granny retired? You've got to be kidding....

Granny nannies do it for good reason: to enable their own children to be able to work longer hours. But granny nannies not only care for their grandchildren, they may also be providing comfort for elderly relatives of their own – and hold down a part-time job at the same time.

Perhaps Super-Granny-Nannies is the correct name for them!


